MEDIA INFORMATION



MEDIA GUIDELINES

CREDENTIALS

Requests for press, radio, photography and television credentials should be made one week prior to the game to insure seating in the press box. Requests should be directed to Sports Information Director Mike Grosz. Only members of the working media will be issued credentials.

Credentials may be picked up at the will-call window, located at the west entrance to Cunningham Field. Credentials must be visible at all times.

RADIO

A visitor's radio booth, equipped with a courtesy phone line, is available on the upper level of the press box. Radio stations should contact the Sports Information Office a week before the game to receive broadcast information.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographers must follow all NCAA and WSC regulations concerning access to the sidelines. *Photographers are not allowed in the team boxes.*

PARKING

Limited space is available in a reserved parking lot located behind the west side of Cunningham Field. Contact the Sports Information Office for parking availability.

WEEKLY INTERVIEWS

WSC coaches and players will be available for interviews Monday through Thursday, except between 1:30-6 p.m. Interview requests should be made through the Sports Information Office.

POST GAME INTERVIEWS

After a brief "cooling off" period, WSC players and coaches will be available for post game interviews. Players will be available outside the WSC locker room, located on the lower level of the Recreation Center, directly west of Memorial Stadium. Coach McLaughlin will meet with the media in the upper level of the Recreation Center following his radio show. Interview requests with WSC players will be taken toward the end of the game.

STATISTICS

A complete package of pre-game notes, depth charts and statistics will be available. Halftime and quarter statistics will also be provided.

Final statistics, including a play-by-play, will be distributed approximately 20 minutes after the game in the upper level of the Recreation Center.

Founded in 1891 as Nebraska Normal College, Wayne State College, in Wayne, Neb. earned a distinguished reputation as a teachers' college from its early days. We're still a great teachers' college—but so much more!

Innovative Programs

Wayne State's four academic schools—Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Counseling, and Natural and Social Sciences—offer a comprehensive selection of courses. You'll find 80 majors and minors ranging from pre-professional studies to criminal justice to a nationally accredited undergraduate sports management program, and many others in 14 academic departments across campus.

The Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) at Wayne State College provides pre-professional training in medicine, pharmacy and dentistry in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Medical Center. Students who successfully complete the program at WSC are automatically accepted into medical, pharmacy, or dental school at UNMC.

Thinking of teaching? Upper-level education majors at Wayne State have the opportunity to participate in the Northeast Nebraska Teacher Academy (NENTA), the first of its kind in the nation, where WSC students receive classroom experience with participating K-12 schools in the region.

Through WSC WebCat On-line, students can register for class, check on grades and student accounts, from the convenience of their home or residence hall room.

Excellent Career Preparation

Whether students plan to be an accountant or a wildlife biologist, they receive the preparation they need at Wayne State College. In addition to classes taught by experts in their fields, Wayne State College provides internship and cooperative programs for students in a number of majors. Many regional businesses actively recruit Wayne State students for internships, with many of these internships resulting in full-time employment after graduation.

The WSC Career Services office assists students with career exploration, job preparation skills, interviews, as well as arranging internships and cooperative experiences.

Personal Attention

Students at Wayne State College don't get lost in the crowd. With an average class size of 21 and a student/faculty ratio of 19:1, WSC students get to know their professors and classmates. Eighty percent of Wayne State professors have the highest degree in their field—and most teach



first-year as well as upper-level classes. You will find dedicated professors and instructors at Wayne State College: teaching is their life's work, and their enthusiasm is contagious.

Wayne State College offers a variety of support services and programs to students. The heart of the WSC campus is the Student Center, where academic and personal support services are located. The Learning Center and Peer Tutoring Program are designed to help all students achieve the highest possible level of success in their studies.

Active Campus Life

With more than 85 clubs and organizations on campus, Wayne State College students have many opportunities to be involved in campus and community life.

Wayne State College has an active Greek life, with Greek Olympics being held at Homecoming each fall, as well as other social and service activities. The Student Activities Board (SAB) plans a variety of special programs each year, bringing musical groups such as Vertical Horizon, Five for Fighting, Goo Goo Dolls, Sawyer Brown, Blackhawk, Dierks Bentley, Firehouse, and others to campus. Comedian Adam Sandler and other national performers have performed on campus.

The Multicultural Center, one of the newest campus programs, provides outreach and support to Wayne State College students and the region through special events during the year.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball and track, cross country, men's baseball, women's softball, men's and women's golf, and women's soccer. Wayne State has hosted NCAA North Central Regional Championships in cross country (2003 and 2006), the Northern Sun Conference Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic and the Northern Sun Conference baseball and track and field championships.

Scenic Surroundings

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Student Center, Studio Arts Building and Connell Hall. Ramsey Theatre underwent a state-of-the-art renovation in 2002. A new state-of-the-art indoor track was completed in the summer of 2001 in the WSC Recreation Center.

Wayne State College's seven residence halls provide students with a comfortable, affordable and convenient place to live with easy access to the entire campus community. Each hall has lounges and recreation areas, laundry facilities, mail service, academic tutors and study areas. Six of the seven halls are wired for access to the campus computer network from your personal computer. Smoke-free residence halls are also an option.





WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Richard Collings *President*

Dr. Richard Collings is in his fourth year as the 11th president of Wayne State College. Prior to assuming the presidency of Wayne State, Collings was vice chancellor for academic affairs and professor of political science and public affairs at Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, North Carolina, a position he held from 1996-2004. At Western Carolina, he led many academic and administration initiatives, including creating a residential honors college, developing technology partnerships with other institutions throughout the nation and implementing a strategic planning process.

From 1991-96, Collings was provost and vice president for academic affairs at Kutztown University of Pennsylvania, where he had served as dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences from 1989-91. Previously, he was assistant provost and chairperson of the department of political science at Southeast Missouri State in Cape Girardeau, Mo.

A native of Louisville, Ky., Collings earned a Ph.D. in political science in 1977 and a master's degree in Latin American studies in 1972, both from Tulane University. He received a bachelor's degree in international studies from the University of Louisville in 1968.

President Collings and his wife, Marilyn, have three grown children: Michael, Kristen and Kelly. They also have two grandchildren, Ethan and Kai.



Eric Schoh *Director of Athletics*

Entering his fourth year as athletic director, Eric Schoh has injected enthusiasm and success into the Wildcat athletic department.

Wayne State College placed third in the 2006-07 Northern Sun Conference All-Sports Standings by winning four conference championships (women's cross country, men's indoor track and field, baseball and men's outdoor track and field). Two teams (volleyball and baseball) also qualified for NCAA post-season competition.

"Everyone associated with Wildcat athletics should be proud of our accomplishments this past year," said Schoh. "The student-athletes, coaches, campus community and people of Wayne all had a hand in our success. It is a credit to the quality student-athletes we have at Wayne State when you are able to combine academic accomplishments with athletic success."

Prior to coming to Wayne State, Schoh was the associate athletic director for development at California State University in Bakersfield, Calif. from 2002-2004. From 1998-2002, Schoh was associate director of athletics at the University of South Dakota. He was the regional director of D.D. Marketing Inc. in Pueblo, Colorado from 1997-98 and was the assistant director of athletics at Montana State University in Billings, Montana from 1995-97.

Schoh earned his master's degree in education from Iowa State University. He earned his bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communications from Iowa State University as well.

Schoh is a native of LaCrescent, Minnesota. He and his wife, Stephanie, have three children: Paige, Eric and Tyler.



Mike Barry *Assistant Director of Athletics*

Mike Barry is in his eighth year as associate director of athletics. Barry is also in his 10th year as the director of sports and recreational facilities. His duties include scheduling athletic contests and practices, home game management and serving as the athletic and recreational facilities' coordinator.

Barry was the Wayne State women's basketball head coach for seven seasons. He compiled a 97-92 record, which is second all-time on the school's career victory list. His best team was the 1993-94 squad which posted a 22-5 record.

Barry came to Wayne State following two years as an assistant women's basketball coach at Pratt Community College in Kansas. He also coached at Chadron State, Eastern New Mexico University, and Fullerton and Stuart high schools in Nebraska.

Barry, a native of Grant, Neb., was a four-sport athlete at Chadron State. He was a three-time NAIA national qualifier in the triple jump, and also lettered in basketball, football, and cross country.

Barry earned his Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education from Chadron State in 1983 and earned his Master's Degree in Secondary Education in 1988. He and his wife, Jeannette, have two sons, Jordan, 15, and Jalen, 12. Barry also has a son Rick, who lives in Crawford, Nebraska.



Shawn Percy *Faculty Athletic Representative*

Dr. Shawn Percy is in his fourth year as Faculty Athletic Representative at Wayne State College. Percy, an associate professor in the Life Sciences Department, is in his 10th year teaching at the school.

An Indiana native, Percy attended Purdue University and Indiana University, earning his bachelors degree from Indiana University in 1989. While an undergraduate, he participated in crew, ultimate and lacrosse. Percy attended graduate school at Washington State University, completing his doctorate in Zoo-physiology in 1996. He enjoys teaching general biology, human physiology and vertebrae embryology at WSC. Percy is also a nationally-certified EMT and firefighter and serves on the Wayne Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field

Memorial Stadium has been "Home of the Wildcats" since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium following World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The press box was built at the time of the grandstand construction, with a second level being added in 1969.

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans. New bleachers were installed on the east side of the field in the fall of 2007 with seating for another 750 fans. Bob Cunningham Field has a natural grass surface.



Recreation Center

The Wayne State College Recreation Center opened in 1987 and is the college's main facility for student recreation and selected athletic activities.

The main area in the Recreation Center provides a six-lane running track and three full-size courts for basketball, volleyball, tennis, and badminton. The rec center running track was recently redone with one of the best surfaces in the world. Racquetball, weight training, aerobics, gymnastics, wrestling, and sauna facilities are all available to WSC students, faculty and staff as well as residents of the Wayne community.

The Recreation Center also houses locker rooms for Wildcat athletic teams, and offices for the WSC athletic department.



Carlson Natatorium

Carlson Natatorium adjoins the Recreation Center and Rice Auditorium. The 25-yard long pool is used for a variety of functions, including lap swimming, aquasize classes, senior wellness aquasize classes, HHPS classes, intramural activities and athletic training rehabilitation exercises. The natatorium is open in the summer for use by athletic camps and Rec Center members.





WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Strength Training Complex

The Strength Training Complex at Wayne State is one of the finest equipped facilities in the Nebraska State College system.

The 2,400 square foot facility is located in Rice Auditorium. The additional facilities in Rice and the adjacent Recreation Center provide athletes with both space and a wide range of equipment necessary to address their diverse needs.

The strength and conditioning facilities have been carefully designed to maximize workout efficiency and effectiveness, and are furnished with newly purchased state-of-the-art equipment that complements the existing equipment. Athletes have access to 10,000 pounds of free weights. Also included are three Olympic/Power lifting platforms; a large dumbbell area with adjustable benches; dumbbells ranging from ten to 120 lbs and a full range of various sized plyometric boxes.

Additionally, six power squat cages with adjustable benches allow each station to be a self-contained power area. Each station allows an athlete to squat, bench press, incline bench press, power clean, and push press, allowing flexibility according to the traffic demands and needs of the athletes. All lifting movements take place within the safely contained confines of a self-spotting power cage.



Pete Chapman Baseball & Softball Complex

The baseball and softball complex opened in the spring of 1996. Located north of Memorial Stadium, the complex provides a picturesque setting for baseball and softball games. The complex was necessary after the previous softball field was converted into a parking lot. In addition, the baseball team played its games off campus at the local American Legion field.

The baseball field received a facelift in the summer of 2004 with the additions of locker rooms, restrooms, a concession stand and press box. A new wood fence was installed on the baseball field prior to the start of the 2005 season.

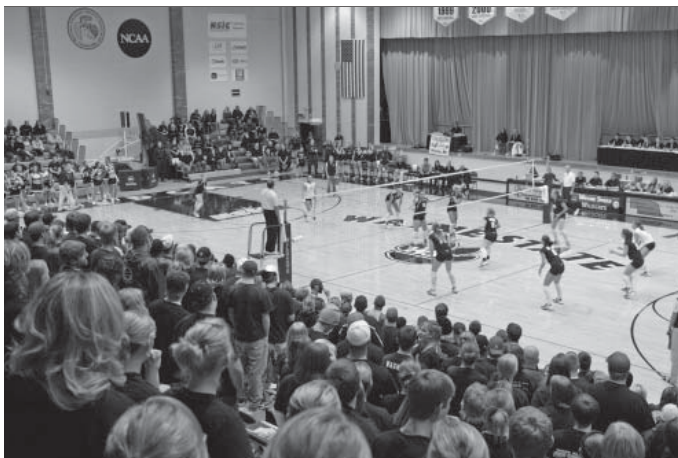
In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex in honor of the late athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department. In the fall of 2006, a locker room/press box was built at the softball field. A new 10-inning scoreboard was placed at the baseball field in the fall of 2007 in right-center field.



Rice Auditorium

Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad. Recent upgrades to the arena include: new balcony seats and new stage curtain in the summer of 2007; a new playing surface in 2004; new scoreboards on the north and south walls (summer of 1998) and new bleachers in the lower level (summer of 1996).

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College's president from 1951-'56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships and the 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic.





ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



TJ Horton
Head Athletic Trainer

TJ Horton is in his second year at Wayne State College and first as head athletic trainer after serving in an assistant athletic trainer role in 2006-07. He will oversee athletic training responsibilities for 15 varsity sports at Wayne State College.

Before coming to Wayne State, the Deerfield, Kansas native worked at Carson-Newman College in Tennessee, a small Division II school. His responsibilities included working with men's and women's soccer and baseball along with teaching introduction to athletic training. Horton also served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer at Creighton University in Omaha while working on his masters degree at UNO. At Creighton, Horton worked with women's soccer, softball and men's and women's tennis.

Horton earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Tulsa in 2003 and his masters degree from Nebraska-Omaha in 2005.

Athletic Training Room

The Athletic Training Room is the site of taping, treatment and injury evaluations. It has a variety of up to date, quality equipment. A partial inventory of modalities available for athletes include: three whirlpools, RichMar Theratouch 7.7 electrical stimulation machine, RichMar HV-II combination ultrasound/electrical stimulation machine, RichMar portable ultrasound machine, Game-ready intermittent compression machine, Therabath Parafin machine, and Hydrocollator heat pack units. The athletic training room also has three computers.



Dr. Steven Stokesbary
Team Orthopedist

Dr. Steven Stokesbary enters his sixth season as Wayne State's team orthopedist.

Dr. Stokesbary is a partner in The Center for Neurosciences, Orthopaedics, and Spine Sports Medicine, P.C. (CNOS) in Dakota Dunes, South Dakota. He graduated from the University of Iowa and earned his medical degree also from the University of Iowa College of Medicine, after which he completed his residency at the University of Missouri Health Services.

Dr. Stokesbary has been practicing for CNOS Sports Medicine for over seven years, which provides athletic training services for over 40 area high schools, colleges and professional organizations.

The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center

The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center, which opened December 1, 2005, brings a state-of-the-art physical therapy and athletic training facility to its campus. This 4,000-square foot center is located next to the Wayne State College Recreation Center and will serve as the hub of treatment and rehabilitation services.

Dedicated to quality care, The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center provides the finest in sports rehabilitation, physical therapy and athletic training services to Wayne State student-athletes, campus community and the general public.

In addition to this new facility, The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center also utilizes the Carlson Natatorium for the aquatic therapy program. The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center represents excellence; a total commitment by Wayne State College to the health of its' students and desire to be an active member of the Wayne community by opening its' doors to the public.





HEAD COACH DAN MCLAUGHLIN



Dan McLaughlin is in his third season as head football coach at Wayne State College, guiding the Wildcats to a 9-13 overall mark and an 8-7 mark in Northern Sun Conference play. The Wildcats have posted their best-ever finishes in NSIC play under McLaughlin, going 4-3 in 2005 and 4-4 in 2006. The tie for third place in conference play during the 2006

season was the highest finish for a WSC football team since joining the NSIC in 1999.

Under McLaughlin in 2006, the Wildcats recorded their first three-game winning streak in football since 1995 and posted back-to-back shutout wins for the first time since the 1976 season. Also serving as offensive line coach, the Wildcats allowed an NSIC-low two sacks in league play under the coaching of McLaughlin in the 2006 season.

Dan McLaughlin was hired as the 21st head football coach at Wayne State College on Dec. 9, 2004. He comes to Wayne State after spending one season as offensive coordinator at Minnesota State in Mankato, Minnesota where he helped the Mavericks to a 6-5 record in 2004 after the team went 0-11 in 2003. It was Minnesota State's first winning season in football since 1994. He

also served as offensive line coach with the Mavericks under head coach Jeff Jamrog. In 2003, McLaughlin was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Nebraska, working as an assistant offensive line coach and assistant special teams coach while coordinating Nebraska's walk-on program.

Before moving to the college ranks, McLaughlin achieved success at the high school level in Nebraska by winning state championships at three different schools. He was the head coach at Millard West from 1995 to 2002, guiding the Wildcats to seven consecutive playoff appearances. His 2001 team went 12-1 and captured the Class A state title. McLaughlin was the head coach at Norfolk High School from 1988 to 1994, leading the Panthers to the Class A state title in 1994. McLaughlin also coached at Broken Bow High School in 1987 and led the school to the Class B state crown in his only season at Broken Bow.

Believed to be the only head coach in Nebraska high school football history to win state titles at three different schools, McLaughlin compiled a high school coaching record of 110-59.

McLaughlin earned his master's degree from Wayne State College in 1992. He is a native of Sheridan, Montana and is a 1982 graduate of Bellevue College. Dan and his wife Nadine have two sons, Scott and Sean, and reside in Pilger, Neb.



WILDCAT ASSISTANT COACHES



Clint Brown
Defensive Coordinator

Clint Brown is in his third season at Wayne State College as the team's defensive coordinator. In his first two seasons as the Wildcats' defensive coordinator, Brown has helped the WSC defense move up the NSIC defensive statistical categories. The Wildcats posted back-to-back shutouts in 2006 (28-0 at Minnesota, Crookston and 7-0 vs. Northern State) for the first time

since 1976.

Brown comes to Wayne State from New Mexico State, where he was a defensive backs coach for two years. Prior to coaching at New Mexico State, Brown was a defensive coordinator at Bethel College in North Newton, Kansas. He also served as the team's recruiting coordinator and academic coordinator for the football program. While at Bethel College, the team posted an 8-2 record.

Before moving to Bethel College, Brown served as a graduate assistant at New Mexico State where he coached the linebackers and the secondary. Prior to New Mexico State, he served as a graduate assistant at University of Nebraska-Omaha (1996, defensive ends) and an assistant at Nebraska Wesleyan (1995, linebackers).

Brown earned two letters as a member of the Nebraska Cornhusker program. He was a member of the 1994 National Championship team that went 13-0, including a 24-17 win over Miami (FL) in the FedEx Orange Bowl. Brown also played in the 1993 FedEx Orange Bowl.

Brown received his Bachelor's Degree from the University of Nebraska in 1996 and earned his Master's Degree from New Mexico State University in 1999. A native of Arlington, Nebraska, Clint and his wife Stephanie reside in Wayne.



Gene Suhr
Offensive Coordinator

Gene Suhr is in his first season on the Wildcat football coaching staff, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

Suhr comes to Wayne State after coaching 23 seasons at Papillion-LaVista High School, posting an impressive 174-74 mark as Monarchs' coach. He won Class A State Championships in 1990

and 1996 while earning state runner up finishes in 1985, 1995 and 1997. His overall high school coaching record was 200-95.

The University of Nebraska-Omaha graduate started his coaching career at Omaha Gross, where he served three seasons as an assistant coach. Suhr was named head coach at Ord High School in 1979 and compiled a 26-21 mark before being named head coach at Papillion-LaVista High School.



Mike Cordes
Special Teams / Linebackers

Mike Cordes is in his third season as special teams coordinator at Wayne State College. He is also coaching linebackers this season after working with defensive backs the previous two years. Cordes is also in his second year as equipment coordinator for all 15 Wayne State College sports in the 2006-07 school year.

Prior to coming to Wayne State, Cordes served as linebackers/secondary coach at the University of South Dakota. Cordes was a two-time captain and three-year letterwinner at the University of Nebraska-Kearney, helping the Lopers to an RMAC title in 2002 and a spot in the Division II Playoffs. As a three-year starter, Cordes finished with 12 sacks, 37 tackles for loss and 243 career tackles. Cordes was selected first team All-RMAC in 2002 and second team all-conference in 2001. Prior to playing at Nebraska-Kearney, he played at Wayne State College in 1997, recording 73 tackles and 11 tackles for loss.

Cordes earned his Bachelor's Degree in economics in 2001 and his Master's Degree in sports administration in 2004. He is a native of York, Nebraska and resides in Wayne with his wife Chelsea.

Running Backs

Lance Griffin is in his third season as a graduate assistant coach at Wayne State College. He is helping coach the running backs. WSC ranked first in the Northern Sun Conference in rushing offense in the 2006 season, averaging 167.6 yards per game in conference play under the coaching of Griffin.

Griffin comes from arguably the top running back school in the state of Nebraska, Omaha Central. Lance is a 1998 graduate of Central High School in Omaha. He played two years of college football at Iowa Central Community College, then transferred to Bowie State in Maryland where he closed out his collegiate career. Griffin spent the 2004 season as an assistant coach at Omaha Central High School. He is working toward his masters degree in sport management at Wayne State College and resides in Wayne.

Charles Hafley *Defensive Backs*

Charles Hafley is a new member to the Wildcat coaching staff as a graduate assistant coach at Wayne State College, helping coach the defensive backs. Hafley comes to WSC after serving two seasons (2005 and 2006) as head coach at Fort Lauderdale High School in Florida. He also served as defensive coordinator at Coral Gables HS in 2004 and was the offensive coordinator at Pompano Beach

High School in Florida in the 2003 season.

Hafley, a graduate of Ely High School in Pompano Beach, Florida, was a standout safety at Clemson University from 1998-2001, earning Second Team All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors as a senior. He was the third leading tackler in his junior and senior seasons with the Tigers and in 2000 became just the third Clemson defensive back to record a 100 tackle season (106). He followed that up in his senior season with 128 tackles and a team-high four interceptions. Had career-high 14 tackles for Clemson in 2000 Gator Bowl against Virginia Tech. Following his career at Clemson, Hafley spent the 2002 season on the practice squad of the New York Giants and played in the Arena Football League in 2003 with the Indiana Firebirds and San Jose Sabercats before starting his coaching career.

Hafley earned a sociology degree from Clemson University in August, 2001 and is working toward a masters degree at Wayne State College.



Scott McLaughlin *Defensive Line*

Scott McLaughlin is in his first season as a graduate assistant football coach at Wayne State College, working with the defensive lineman. McLaughlin is a graduate of the University of Nebraska-Omaha and played defensive line for the Mavericks. He also served as a student assistant at UNO and served as the team's video coordinator for three seasons before coming to Wayne State College.

In high school, Scott earned Class A All-State honors at Millard West after recording 11 sacks and 19 tackles for loss as a senior to earn honorary captain honors on the Class A All-State Defensive Team.

2007 SEASON OUTLOOK



Wayne State head football coach Dan McLaughlin has elevated the level of Wildcat football in his two seasons at Wayne, but is far from pleased with where the program is at entering his third season. The Wildcats posted a 5-6 overall mark and finished in a tie for third in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference at 4-4, recording the highest finish for a WSC football team since joining the league in 1999. A pair of three point losses at home (40-37 to league champion Bemidji State and 27-24 to Concordia-St. Paul) kept the Wildcats from posting their first winning season since 1995 when the 'Cats went 6-4.

Under McLaughlin, the Wildcats continue to improve as WSC posted a three-game winning streak last season for the first time since 1995 and recorded back-to-back shutout wins for the first time since 1976. The 'Cats field a young squad again in 2007 with just six seniors to go with 18 juniors, 17 sophomores, 17 redshirt freshmen and 27 true freshmen making up the roster of 85 players.

"We are very excited and optimistic about our football season like everyone else at this time of the year," said McLaughlin, who is 9-13 overall and 8-7 in the NSIC, entering his third season. "We look to be much improved over the past two seasons."

Wayne State returns eight starters on offense and four on defense, but will have to replace several key losses on both sides of the ball. Running back Zach Molacek, the 2006 NSIC Offensive Player of the Year, was lost to graduation, along with senior defensive back Adam Peterson. Both players were Second Team All-Northwest Region selections in 2006. Molacek rushed for 1,155 yard last season and finished his career as the second-leading rusher in school history at 3,391 yards while Peterson was a four-year starter who finished his WSC career with 280

tackles and 10 interceptions.

Offensively, the Wildcats return talented sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen. The Bellevue West product became the starter in the third game of the season as a true freshman and guided the Wildcats to a strong finish, throwing for 1,595 yards (105 of 243) with 13 touchdowns and just eight interceptions. He will be protected by an experienced offensive line that returns four starters and allowed just two sacks in NSIC play last season. Junior left guard Brian Okonofua (***pictured left***), a Second Team All-NSIC selection in 2006, has started every game in his two year career. Senior center Jay Miller is a three year starter while junior left tackle Brandon Carlson and sophomore right guard Rex Osborne started every game last season. Senior tackle Scott Umphenour looks to fill the other starting offensive line spot vacated by the graduation of Colby Herron, a three-year starter.



Sophomore Logan Masters (***pictured left***) is the top returning wide receiver after a standout freshman season. The Storm Lake, Iowa native hauled in a team-high 44 catches last season for 693 yards and seven touchdowns to rank sixth in the NSIC in receiving yards per game (68.0 ypg). Junior Brian Chapman and senior Stuart Morrow bring veteran experience to the wide receiver position and will contend for playing time. At tight end, sophomore Brian Locke (Omaha South) had a strong spring and looks to be in contention to start after making nine catches for 90 yards last season.



The Wildcats will call upon several players to fill the void at running back with the graduation of Zach Molacek. Junior college transfer Travis Rhone (Cedar Rapids, Iowa) rushed for 1,101 yards last season at

Iowa Central Community College and has worked hard over the summer to fill the role of Molacek. Red-shirt sophomore Alex Hall (Lincoln Northstar HS), who started seven games in 2005, and sophomore Eric Meyer (Hooper Logan View HS), will also vie for playing time in the backfield.

WSC has a pair of experienced kickers back on special teams. Kurtis Hoefling averaged 33.7 yards on 30 punts last season while splitting time with baseball player Ian De-Laet, who will focus on baseball this season. Sophomore Nick Hope became the starting placekicker midway through the 2006 season and 10 of 11 on PAT kicks and 5 of 9 in field goals, including a long of 42 yards. Redshirt freshman Bryce Miller of Norfolk Catholic will also battle for time at the kicking position.

On defense, the linebacker position returns the most experience with all three starters back along with a strong group of players battling for playing time. Senior middle linebacker Nick Baldetti (*pictured above center*) ranked third last season with 73 tackles and anchors a strong group in the middle of the Wildcats' defense. Junior outside linebacker Luke Hoffman (*pictured right*) recorded a team-high 100 tackles last season at the will linebacker position while sophomore Aaron Nielsen (Creighton) appeared in all 11 games as a true freshman in 2006 and notched 53 tackles to rank sixth on the team. Other returning linebackers that will compete for time include sophomore Ryan Reeves (Wahoo Neumann), sophomore Kyle Garnder (Wakefield), sophomore Tyler Gebers (Holstein, Iowa) and sophomore Landon Stender (Battle Creek, Neb.).

Although all four starters on the defensive line graduated, the Wildcats appear to be strong up front with key backups from last season and several newcomers

expected to take over. Junior Tyler Krueger of Pierce (four sacks and 20 tackles in 2006) and sophomore Austin Stanley (Lincoln Pius) had strong springs according to defensive coordinator Clint Brown. Defensive end Troy Pribnow (Scribner-Snyder) had three sacks and 20 tackles last season and also had a strong spring. Redshirt freshman Nehemiah Blackburn (Omaha Northwest) and junior college transfers Darius Davis (Scottsdale CC) and Wesley Sells (Phoenix CC) also will contend for starting spots on the defensive line.

Sophomore Robert Manuel is the lone returning starter in the secondary and is the projected starter at left cornerback for the Wildcats in 2007. The Houston, Texas native had three interceptions last season and ranked fifth on the team in tackles with 60. Junior B.J. Campbell is projected to start at right corner after

a strong spring. Stanton junior Ryan Molacek (free safety) and sophomore Matt Greenway of Lincoln Pius (strong safety) are the projected starters at the safety positions. Transfers Benny Collins (cornerback) and Reno Bloomquist (safety) will also contend for playing time. A newcomer expected to contribute in the secondary immediately is Delta

State (Miss.) transfer Nile Legania, a senior who made 41 tackles with eight pass breakups in 2005. He was also a standout punt returner at Delta State who could help the Wildcats on special teams as well.

The Wildcats open the 2007 season at Chadron State on Saturday, September 1 starting at 1:00 p.m. followed by the home opener against Nebraska-Kearney on September 8th in Wayne. WSC opens the NSIC schedule at Upper Iowa on September 15, followed by home games in league play against MSU Moorhead (September 22) and the Homecoming/Hall of Fame Game vs. Minnesota, Crookston on September 29.

GAME 1 - Upper Iowa 24, Wayne State 14

Aug. 31, 2006 * Bob Cunningham Field * Wayne Neb.

Upper Iowa University took advantage of five Wayne State College turnovers to win their Northern Sun Conference debut, 24-14, in Wayne, Nebraska at Cunningham Field. The visiting Peacocks used a balanced offensive attack (209 passing and 162 rushing for 347 total yards) while limiting Wayne State to just 253 yards in the game.

After a scoreless first quarter where WSC gained just 20 yards on 15 plays, Upper Iowa opened the scoring on a 62 yard punt return by Ryan Hudgins with 14:33 left in the first half to grab a 7-0 lead. Wayne State responded with a 12-play, 91 yard drive to tie the score at 7-7 midway through the second quarter as Zach Molacek capped the scoring drive on a one-yard run. However, Upper Iowa closed the half with a time-consuming drive as the Peacocks marched 77 yards on 12 plays, capped by an Andrew Jones two-yard plunge with :23 seconds left in the half, to take a 14-7 halftime lead.

The game remained 14-7 until late in the fourth quarter when Upper Iowa's Derek Van Horn converted on a 22 yard field goal to give Upper Iowa a 17-7 lead. WSC countered with a three-play, 62 yard drive as Josh Peterson hauled in a 21-yard pass from Travis Dietz with 1:30 left in the game, cutting the Peacock's lead to 17-14. Upper Iowa recovered an onside kick from Wayne State, then sealed the win on a 43 yard run by D.J. Speed with :57 left to make the final score 24-14.

Upper Iowa had 347 yards of total offense to Wayne State's 253. UIU quarterback Andrew Jones completed 21 of 39 passes for 209 yards with one interception. The Peacock's top rusher was D.J. Speed with 60 yards on four carries while T.C. Hicks added 51 yards on 20 carries. Dwayne Croker hauled in six receptions for 37 yards to lead Upper Iowa in receiving.

Wayne State sophomore quarterback Travis Dietz completed 15 of 30 passes with five interceptions and one touchdown for a total of 164 yards. Senior Zach Molacek gained 77 yards on the ground on 22 carries while freshman receiver Logan Masters caught a team-high five receptions for 52 yards.

Defensively, Upper Iowa was led by Calvin Jones with nine tackles while Scott Langill added eight. Sophomore linebacker Anthony Calamita had two interceptions for the Peacocks.

Wayne State's top tackler was senior safety Adam Peterson with 11 tackles while Omari Green chipped in with nine stops.

GAME 2 - Nebraska-Kearney 23, Wayne State 14

Sept. 9, 2006 * Foster Field * Kearney, Neb.

Nebraska-Kearney used a balanced offensive attack to down Wayne State 23-14 in college football played at Foster Field in Kearney. The host Lopers improved to 1-1 on the season while notching their ninth straight win over Wayne State, who falls to 0-2 on the season.

UNK held a 453-194 advantage in total offense over Wayne State, recording 23 first downs to eight for the Wildcats. The Lopers gained 238 yards on the ground and 215 more passing to grind out the win.

After a scoreless first quarter, UNK opened the scoring early in the second quarter on a Jake Richards 60 yard run to take a 7-0 lead with 13:42 remaining in the first half. Wayne State tied the score later in the second quarter on a defensive score as senior safety Adam Peterson rambled 76 yards on a fumble return with 4:03 left in the half to tie the score at 7-7. UNK regained the lead late in the first half on a 28 yard field goal by Geoff Carnahan with :22 seconds remaining in the half to take a 10-7 lead at halftime.

The Lopers increased their lead early in the third quarter when quarterback Kevin Arbuckle connected with Eric Myrick on a 27-yard pass play, putting UNK up 16-7 with 9:55 to go in the third quarter. WSC cut into the lead late in the third quarter when Zach Molacek scored on a 12-yard run, capping a six-play, 85 yard drive to make the score 16-14 with 2:44 left in the third quarter. UNK put an insurance score on the board midway through the fourth quarter when Arbuckle tossed a 24-yard scoring strike to Cory Sleeth, making the score 23-14 with 8:41 left in the game to round out the scoring.

UNK junior running back Jake Richards had a big night for the Lopers on the ground, rushing for 188 yards on 35 carries and one score. Loper quarterback Kevin Arbuckle completed 20 of 29 passes for 215 yards with one interception and two touchdowns. Cory Sleeth and Eric Myrick were the top receivers for the Lopers with seven catches apiece.

Zach Molacek led Wayne State offensively with 64 yards rushing on 14 carries, including a 12-yard touchdown run. Sophomore quarterback Travis Dietz was 4 of 9 passing for 55 yards while freshman Silas Fluellen completed 3 of 15 passes for 95 yards. Freshman Logan Masters was the top receiver for WSC with two receptions for 52 yards.

Defensively, Adam Peterson had a big night for Wayne State. The senior safety had a hand in both UNK turnovers, returning a fumble 76 yards for a touchdown and recording one interception for 46 yards. Sophomore linebacker Luke Hoffman had 14 tackles to lead the WSC defense while freshman linebacker Aaron Nielsen added 12 stops, including nine solo tackles.

GAME 3 - Chadron State 38, Wayne State 14

Sept. 16, 2006 * Bob Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

Chadron State running back Danny Woodhead rushed for a career-high 324 yards and scored four touchdowns to lead the Eagles past Wayne State 38-14 Saturday afternoon before 2,161 fans at Cunningham Field in Wayne. Chadron State improved to 3-0 with the win while Wayne State fell to 0-3. Woodhead scored on touchdown runs of 3, 4, 10 and 28 yards to lead Chadron State in the win. It was the third career 300 yard game for Woodhead, a junior at Chadron State College.

Chadron State opened the scoring midway through the first quarter on a 21-yard field goal by Travis Atter, giving the Eagles a 3-0 lead. Woodhead scored the first of his four touchdowns on a four-yard run with 13:02 remaining in the second quarter to put the Eagles ahead 10-0. Sophomore quarterback Joe McLain found Logan Stropko on a 10 yard scoring strike at the 8:04 mark of the second period to give Chadron State a 17-0 lead. Woodhead found the endzone on a three-yard run with 3:45 remaining in the second quarter to give Chadron State a commanding 24-0 lead. Then Wayne State put together a solid drive toward the end of the first half as backup freshman quarterback Silas Fluellen connected with freshman Logan Masters on an acrobatic 20-yard touchdown pass to put the Wildcats on the board, trailing 24-7 at halftime.

The lone score in the third quarter was by Wayne State as Fluellen connected again with Masters on a leaping 18 yard reception in the end zone to cut the Eagles' lead to 24-14 with 4:13 left in the third quarter. But Chadron State and Woodhead put the game away with a pair of scores early in the fourth quarter to finish off the Wildcats. Woodhead's 28 yard run with 14:03 left in the game made the score 31-13, followed by a 10-yard jaunt by Woodhead at the 8:55 mark to round out the scoring, giving Chadron State the 38-14 win.

For the game, Chadron State finished with 513 yards of total offense, including 428 on the ground. Wayne State was held to just 198 yards in the game. Most of Wayne State's offense came from the arm of Fluellen, who was 14 of 31 passing for 160 yards and two touchdowns. Logan Masters was the top receiver for Wayne State with five receptions for 61 yards and two acrobatic touchdown receptions. Josh Peterson added four receptions for 61 yards.

Defensively, senior safety Adam Peterson had 10 tackles to lead Wayne State followed by Luke Hoffman with eight stops. Chadron State's Kalan Jones recorded eight tackles with one sack and two pass breakups.

GAME 4 - Wayne State 24, MSU Moorhead 21

Sept. 22, 2006 * Alex Nemzek Stadium * Moorhead, Minn.

Wayne State College built a 24-7 lead, then had to hang on for a 24-21 win at MSU Moorhead in Northern Sun Conference football played at Nemzek Stadium in Moorhead, Minnesota. It was the first win of the season for the Wildcats, now 1-3 overall and 1-1 in the NSIC while MSU Moorhead slips to 2-2 overall and 0-2 in league play.

WSC took a 3-0 lead with one second remaining in the first quarter when Oscar Cervantes connected on a 32-yard field goal. Freshman quarterback Silas Fluellen, in his first career start, found J.R. Rother on a 36-yard pass play with 6:34 left in the first half to put the Wildcats in front 10-0 to close out first half scoring.

MSU Moorhead's Jabari Taylor returned the second half kickoff 93 yards for a touchdown to pull the Dragons within 10-7 with 14:43 remaining in the third quarter. The Wildcats responded with a seven play, 57 yard drive to take a 17-7 lead as Fluellen found Josh Peterson on a 15-yard pass play with 11:15 left in the third quarter. Following a MSUM turnover, Logan Masters hauled in an 11-yard strike from Fluellen to take a 24-7 lead with 6:31 left in the third quarter. The Dragons started to mount their comeback late in the third quarter when Josh Jones picked up a Zach Molacek fumble and rambled 72 yards for a score, drawing MSUM within 24-13 with 3:45 to go in the third quarter.

The Dragons used a 14-play, 77 yard drive early in the fourth quarter to score again as Bruce Green was on the receiving end of a 12-yard pass from Dustin Long to cut the Wildcat lead down to three, 24-21, after a two-point pass conversion from Long to Bert Smith. MSU Moorhead had the ball with 3:44 to play at their own 16-yard line and drove to the WSC 49-yard line, but Laron Striplin forced a fumble and recovered the ball to stop the Dragons' drive and secure the win for Wayne State.

Wayne State gained 394 yards in total offense compared to MSU Moorhead's 238 yards. Fluellen completed 15 of 32 passes for 242 yards with three touchdowns and two interceptions. His top receiver was Logan Masters with five receptions for 100 yards and one touchdown. Senior running back Zach Molacek added 80 yards rushing on 22 carries.

For MSU Moorhead, quarterback Dustin Long was 22 of 33 passing for 144 yards with one interception and one touchdown. Junior linebacker Nick Baldetti led Wayne State on defense with nine tackles, including 1.5 tackles for loss for six yards. Laron Striplin added six tackles and two fumble recoveries. Senior running back Zach Molacek rushed for 131 yards on 19 carries and scored one touchdown to lead Wayne State in a 28-0 Northern Sun Conference win at Minnesota-Crookston in college football played in Crookston, Minnesota. The Wildcats improved to 2-3 overall and 2-1 in the NSIC while dropping the Golden Eagles to 0-5 overall and 0-3 in league play.

Wayne State rushed for a season-high 258 yards and accumulated 418 yards, another season-high, in total offense to pick up the win. The Wildcats scored on the opening drive of the game, marching 64 yards in seven plays to take a 7-0 lead following a 26-yard scoring pass from Silas Fluellen to Brian Chapman. Molacek found the endzone early in the second quarter on a 28-yard touchdown jaunt, putting the Wildcats in front 14-0 with 13:51 left in the first half. GAME 6 - Wayne State 7, Northern State 0

Oct. 7, 2006 * Bob Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

Wayne State blanked Northern State 7-0 in Northern Sun Conference college football played in Wayne, Nebraska on Homecoming/Hall of Fame Day for the Wildcats. It was the third straight win for Wayne State, the first time the Wildcats have won three games in a row in football since the start of the 1995 season when WSC topped UNO (37-30), Morningside (31-27) and Northern State (35-14). The win also marked back-to-back shutouts by Wayne State for the first time since the 1976 when the Wildcats blanked Northwestern of Iowa (19-0) and Peru State (20-0). WSC posted a 28-0 win at Minnesota-Crookston last week.

Wayne State scored on its second drive of the game as freshman Silas Fluellen found J.R. Rother on a 22-yard scoring strike to cap an eight-play, 65 yard drive with 5:49 left in the first quarter. It would end up being the only score of the game although both teams had scoring chances later in the game.

Northern State took the ensuing drive down to the Wayne State five yard line, but a 21-yard field goal attempt by the Wolves' Kyle Schierholt was blocked by Wayne State's Nathan Meyer to stop the scoring threat. The Wolves had two other drives in the first half reach the Wildcat 23-yard line, but the Wayne State defense held and the Wildcats took over on downs each time.

In the second half, WSC moved the ball to the Northern State six yard line early in the fourth quarter, but the Wildcats settled for a 31-yard field goal attempt by Oscar Cervantes, which was wide left. Northern State then moved the ball to the Wildcat 35-yard line, but a pair of sacks by the Wayne State defense pushed back the Wolves to near midfield and Wayne State ran out the clock to seal its' first three-game win streak in 11 years.

Wayne State held a slight advantage in total offense in the defensive battle, 227-218. The Wildcats rushed for 144 yards while holding the Wolves to minus two yards rushing as a team. NSU had 220 yards passing to 83 for the Wildcats. Senior running back Zach Molacek led the Wildcats on the ground with 81 yards on 15 carries while redshirt freshman Tyler Jones contributed 41 yards on 13 attempts.

In the passing department, Silas Fluellen was 6 of 18 for 79 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. Logan Masters was the top receiver for WSC with two receptions for 41 yards.

Defensively, senior safety Adam Peterson had 15 tackles, including 1.5 sacks, and one interception for the Wildcats.

GAME 7 - Bemidji State 40, Wayne State 37

Oct. 14, 2006 * Bob Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

Bemidji State outlasted Wayne State 40-37 in a Northern Sun Conference shootout played at Cunningham Field in Wayne. The two teams combined for 894 yards in the game. With the win, Bemidji State remained in a tie for first in the NSIC with Winona State at 4-0 in league play and 5-2 overall while Wayne State had its' three-game win streak snapped as the Wildcats fall to 3-4 overall and 3-2 in the NSIC.

Wayne State took the opening drive and marched down the field for a touchdown as Silas Fluellen's 33-yard pass to Logan Masters capped a seven-play, 80-yard drive to take an early 7-0 lead. Following an interception by WSC senior safety Adam Peterson, the Wildcats got the ball at midfield and struck for another score as Fluellen and Masters hooked up on a 42 yard scoring play to put the Wildcats in front 14-0 with 9:56 left in the first quarter.

Bemidji State blocked a Wayne State punt late in the first quarter to get the ball at the Wildcat 44-yard line and used a five-yard run by James Moore with 14:18 left in the second quarter. The Beavers struck for another score moments later as Matt Heber picked off a Silas Fluellen pass and rambled 25 yards for a touchdown to make the score 14-13 after WSC blocked the Beavers' point after kick. Bemidji State grabbed their first lead of the game with 10:11 left in the second quarter when Michael McDonald connected on a 34-yard field goal to give the Beavers a 16-14 lead. Wayne State countered with a field goal of its own as redshirt freshman Nick Hope made a 42-yard field goal with 32 seconds left in the half to put the Wildcats ahead 17-16. However, BSU put together a late drive to end the first half and used a 27-yard field goal by Michael McDonald on the last play of the first half gave the Beavers a 19-17 lead at halftime.

Bemidji State took the opening drive of the second half and scored on a James Moore 10-yard run to grab a 25-17 lead over the Wildcats. WSC responded as Zach Molacek broke loose and sprinted 79 yards for a score to cut the Beavers' lead to 25-23 with 13:02 left in the third quarter. Bemidji State came right back with a 43-yard drive, capped by a 15-yard pass from Cory Wardrobe to Warren Ballard, to make the score 32-23 Beavers with 12:01 left in the third quarter. The Wildcats then used a seven-play, 74 yard drive, capped by a Zach Molacek one-yard run to make the score 32-30.

Wayne State regained the lead late in the third quarter as Fluellen found Josh Peterson on a 63-yard scoring play to five Wayne State a 37-32 lead with :47 seconds left in the third quarter. Bemidji State bounced right back with a 79-yard drive on seven plays to take the lead back as Wardrobe connected with Anthony Schreiber on a 29-yard scoring play to put the Beavers in front 40-37 with 13:07 left in the game. WSC took the next drive and marched to the Bemidji State 24-yard line, but the Wildcats were stopped by the BSU defense on fourth and two when Zach Molacek was held to a one-yard gain to stop the Wildcat scoring threat. That would be the final scoring threat for the Wildcats in the fourth quarter as Bemidji State held on for the 40-37 win.

WSC finished with 479 yards compared to Bemidji State's 415. Fluellen threw for a career-high 325 yards on 18 of 39 passing with three touchdowns and one interception. His favorite receiver was freshman Logan Masters with eight receptions for 127 yards and two touchdowns. Zach Molacek added 141 yards rushing on 19 carries and two touchdowns. Bemidji State quarterback Cory Wardrobe was 21 of 29 passing for 255 yards with two touchdowns and three interceptions. James Moore added 112 yards rushing on 22 carries with two touchdowns. Adam Peterson and Luke Hoffman led WSC on defense with nine tackles each. Peterson also had an interception and a blocked extra point. GAME 8 - Wayne State 27, SW Minn. State 24

Oct. 21, 2006 * Mattke Field * Marshall, Minn.

Wayne State rallied from 14-0 first quarter deficit to post a 27-24 win at Southwest Minnesota State in Northern Sun Conference football played in Marshall, Minnesota. The Wildcats moved into sole possession of third place in the NSIC with a 4-2 league mark and are 4-4 overall while SMSU falls to 4-4 overall and 3-2 in the league.

The Mustangs jumped out to an early 14-0 lead, taking advantage of two interceptions by WSC freshman quarterback Silas Fluellen that gave the Mustangs great field position on both scores. The first Mustang scoring drive covered four yards as Paul Benesh scored on a four-yard run to give SMSU a 7-0 lead with 10:35 left in the first quarter. Following a second Fluellen pick, the Mustangs drove 36 yards with quarterback Josh Shudlick scoring on a one-yard run to put the Mustangs ahead 14-0 with 3:359 left in the first quarter.

WSC got on the scoreboard early in the second quarter as Nick Hope booted a 30-yard field goal, capping a 13-play, 57-yard drive, making the score 14-3 with 14:57 remaining in the second quarter. The Wildcats took advantage of an SMSU turnover later in the quarter to cut into the Mustang lead as Zach Molacek rambled 51 yards for a touchdown with 6:39 left in the second quarter to make the score 14-10. SMSU closed the first half scoring on the final play of the half as Scott Talcott connected on a 22-yard field goal to give Southwest Minnesota State a 17-10 lead at halftime.

WSC tied the score early in the third quarter following a SMSU turnover as Molacek found the endzone from 28 yards out, knotting the score at 17-17 with 10:50 remaining in the third quarter. The Wildcats took advantage of a bad punt snap by the Mustangs, giving WSC the ball at the SMSU 14 yard line, to take their first lead of the game as Nick Hope made a 28-yard field goal with 3:34 remaining in the third quarter to take a 20-17 lead.

SMSU used an eight-play, 95-yard drive to regain the lead early in the fourth quarter when Josh Shudlick tossed a nine-yard scoring strike to Ross DeMasi, giving the Mustangs a 24-20 lead with 14:54 left in the game. Wayne State put together an 80-yard scoring drive later in the quarter as Molacek scored from the three-yard line with 6:13 left in the game to put the Wildcats back in front 27-24. On the next drive, SMSU moved the ball to the WSC 35-yard line, but WSC linebacker Nick Baldetti recovered a fumble by SMSU quarterback Josh Shudlick to evade the Mustangs' scoring threat. WSC was forced to punt in the final minute and a desperation pass by Shudlick was intercepted by Wayne State's Robert Manuel, his second interception of the game, to preserve the Wildcat win.

WSC had one more yard in total offense than SMSU, 308-307. The Wildcats had 208 yards rushing and 100 passing. Senior running back Zach Molacek had a milestone day for the Wildcats on the ground, rushing for 188 yards on 29 carries with three touchdowns. Molacek moved into third place on the all-time rushing list at WSC with 3,009 yards, making him just the fourth runner in school history to surpass 3,000 yards. He passed Sam Singleton (3,003 yards from 1967-70) to move into third place on the all-time rushing list with his third 100 yard game of the season.

In passing, Silas Fluellen finished 9 of 17 for 100 yards with two interceptions. His top receiver was Logan Masters with three receptions for 44 yards. Defensively, sophomore linebacker Luke Hoffman had 10 tackles and one forced fumble. Freshman Robert Manuel had two interceptions while Nick Baldetti, Trent Kling and Aaron Nielsen each had one fumble recovery as the Wildcats defense forced five turnovers.

Concordia University-St. Paul held on for a 27-24 Northern Sun Conference football win over Wayne State in the 18th annual Egg Bowl Game played at Cunningham Field in Wayne. The visiting Golden Bears moved to 4-5 overall and 3-3 in the league while Wayne State slips to 4-5 overall and 4-3 in the NSIC. The tightly-contested game featured five lead changes as neither team led by more than six points.

Wayne State scored on their opening series of the game as redshirt freshman Nick Hope made a 22-yard field goal with 8:35 remaining in the first quarter to give the Wildcats an early 3-0 lead. Concordia-St. Paul responded with a field goal of their own as Brody Johnson booted a 36-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3 with 2:33 left in the first quarter. Wayne State countered moments later as Zach Molacek scored on an eight-yard run to cap a four-play, 75 yard drive to give the Wildcats a 9-3 lead following a failed PAT kick with 1:00 left in the first quarter.

Concordia-St. Paul took the next drive down the field to take their first lead of the game as Golden Bears quarterback Kole Goodchild scored on a seven-yard run to culminate a 12 play, 66 yard drive to put CSP in front 10-9 with 10:36 remaining in the first half. WSC took the next drive and moved the ball to the CSP 16-yard line, but Nick Hope's 33 yard field goal was blocked by Concordia-St. Paul's Antonio Brown to stop the scoring threat. The Golden Bears then drove to the WSC two-yard line and settled for a Brody Johnson 20-yard field goal to give CSP a 13-9 lead with 1:37 left in the first half. Wayne State put together a strong drive in the final 90 seconds to take the lead at halftime as freshman quarterback Silas Fluellen found freshman wide receiver Logan Masters in the left corner of the end zone on a 17 yard scoring pass to cap a nine-play, 74 yard drive with one second remaining in the first half. A two-point pass conversion from Fluellen to Brian Chapman gave WSC a 17-13 lead at halftime.

In the third quarter, Concordia-St. Paul regained the lead by scoring on their first drive of the second half as Aaron Cawthorn scored on a four-yard run with 7:29 left in the third quarter to give the Golden Bears a 20-17 edge over the Wildcats. WSC took the ensuing drive and marched to the CSP 22 yard line, however Nick Hope's 38 yard field goal hit the left upright and kept the score 20-17. After holding the Golden Bears, WSC got the ball back at their own 18-yard line and marched 82 yards in 11 plays to regain the lead as Fluellen completed a six yard scoring pass to Josh Peterson to give Wayne State a 24-20 lead with 9:22 left in the game. After CSP mis-handled the ensuing kickoff to start at their own one-yard line, the Golden Bears drove 99 yards on the Wildcats in just five plays to regain the lead as Goodchild found Tyrone Ruffin on a 42-yard scoring strike to put the Golden Bears ahead 27-24. WSC had the ball two more times in the fourth quarter, but was stopped on downs at the CSP 45 and the CSP 49 yard line as the Golden Bears' defense shut down Wayne State the rest of the game to preserve the 27-24 win.

Wayne State outgained Concordia-St. Paul 471-426 as the Wildcats rushed for 227 yards and passed for 244. Senior running back Zach Molacek accounted for 247 yards of total offense to earn Egg Bowl MVP honors for Wayne State. He rushed for 182 yards on 24 carries with one touchdown while adding another 65 yards receiving on four catches. It was the third straight game that Molacek surpassed the 100 yard mark on the ground. Silas Fluellen completed 19 of 38 passes for 244 yards with two touchdowns. Josh Peterson, Molacek and Logan Masters each made four receptions to lead Wildcat receivers.

Concordia-St. Paul junior quarterback Kole Goodchild was named Egg Bowl MVP for the Golden Bears, completing 20 of 32 passes for 273 yards with one touchdown and one interception. He also rushed for 65 yards on nine carries. Aaron Cawthorn was the top rusher for CSP with 74 yards on 13 carries. Defensively, sophomore linebacker Luke Hoffman led Wayne State with 14 tackles (seven solo, seven assisted stops). Jordan Frain paced Concordia-St. Paul on defense with 10 tackles.

2006 GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW



Game 10 - Wayne State 14, Missouri-Rolla 9

Nov. 4, 2006 * Bob Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

Wayne State held Missouri-Rolla, the top-ranked passing team in NCAA Division II, to just 272 yards passing as the Wildcats held off the Miners 14-9 at Cunningham Field in Wayne. With the win, Wayne State improves to 5-5 while Missouri-Rolla slips to 5-5. The win for Wayne State marks the first time since 1995 (6-4) that the Wildcats have won more than four football games in a single season. UMR entered the game averaging 359.0 yards per game passing to lead NCAA Division II, but the Wildcats forced the Miners into five turnovers, including four interceptions, to pick up the win in a defensive battle.

Wayne State opened the scoring early in the second quarter as redshirt freshman Tyler Jones scored on a six yard run to cap a 10-play, 67 yard drive, giving the Wildcats a 7-0 lead with 12:50 remaining in the first half. The Miners answered back with a scoring drive as Tim Valencia booted a 27 yard field goal to culminate a 12 play, 58-yard drive for Missouri-Rolla to make the score 7-3 with 9:13 to go in the second quarter. The next drive saw Wayne State move the ball to the UMR 22 yard line, but a 39-yard field goal attempt by Wayne State's Nick Hope was wide right to end the scoring threat. Both teams failed to move the ball the rest of the first half to make the halftime score 7-3 in favor of Wayne State.

The opening drive of the second half saw Missouri-Rolla move the ball to the Wildcats' nine yard line, but a Joe Winters pass was picked off in the end zone by WSC linebacker Luke Hoffman to stop the scoring threat for the Miners. The Miners put together another solid drive later in the quarter, only to have quarterback Joe Winters fumble at the WSC 20 yard line, recovered by Wildcat defensive back Matt Greenway, to end the drive.

Early in the fourth quarter, Wayne State took advantage of a UMR turnover to score their second touchdown as junior linebacker Nick Baldetti intercepted a Miners pass and returned the ball 20 yards to the UMR 30 yard line. On a fourth and four at the UMR 24, senior running back Zach Molacek broke loose for a 24-yard scoring run to put the Wildcats ahead 14-3 with 11:00 left in the game.

The Miners then turned to backup quarterback Mark Becker to score their first touchdown of the game as he guided Missouri-Rolla on a two-play, 44 yard drive midway through the fourth quarter to make the score 14-9 after connecting with Ashton Gronewald on a 38-yard scoring play. Wayne State was forced to punt on their next series, giving Missouri-Rolla the ball at their own 22-yard line with 1:26 left in the game. The Miners moved the ball to the Wildcat 31-yard line and faced a fourth and seven, but Becker's pass intended for Brandon Landry was intercepted at the goal line by Laron Striplin, who returned the ball to the 24-yard line to preserve the win for the Wildcats.

Missouri-Rolla outgained Wayne State in the contest 353-303. The Wildcats were led offensively by senior running back Zach Molacek, who gained 142 yards rushing on 30 carries with one touchdown. Molacek moved into second place on the all-time rushing charts at Wayne State and now has 3,333 yards for his career. He passed Lamont Rainey, who gained 3,268 yards in his career from 1991-94. Freshman quarterback Silas Fluellen completed just 5 of 17 passes for 89 yards while backup Travis Dietz was 2 of 3 with one interception for 12 yards. Freshman Logan Masters was the top receiver with three catches for 36 yards.

On defense for the Wildcats, sophomore linebacker Luke Hoffman had a team-high 10 tackles to go with one interception. Nick Baldetti, Robert Manuel and Laron Striplin also had interceptions while Matt Greenway recovered a fumble. Sophomore Tyler Krueger had his best game in a Wildcat uniform, recording six tackles with two sacks and one forced fumble.

#20 Winona State defeated Wayne State 31-3 in the NSIC Merchants Bank Metrodome Classic in Minneapolis, Minnesota in the 2006 regular season finale for the Wildcats. Winona State improves to 9-2 and 7-1 in the NSIC and awaits word on a NCAA Division II playoff berth with the announcement coming Sunday afternoon.

Winona State opened the scoring with 8:04 in the first quarter when junior running back Alex Wiese scored on a 30-yard run to put the Warriors in front 7-0. Wiese scored again later in the first quarter on a 17-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Aaron Boettcher at the 2:45 mark of the first quarter, giving Winona State a 14-0 lead after one quarter.

Early in the second quarter, Wayne State got on the board thanks to a 22-yard field goal by Nick Hope, capping an 11-play, 64 yard drive to make the score 14-3 in favor of Winona State with 12:17 left in the second quarter. WSU countered with a field goal of its own when Mike Salerno booted a 22-yard field goal with 8:36 remaining in the first half to put the Warriors ahead 17-3. The Warriors added another score late in the first half when Wiese found the end zone for the third time on a five-yard run to give Winona State a commanding 24-3 lead at halftime.

Defense was the story of the second half for both teams. The Wildcats had a pair of scoring opportunities in the second half but both resulted without any points scored. Luke Hoffman intercepted a Winona State pass with 2:15 left in the third quarter at the Wildcats' 41-yard line. The 'Cats drove the ball to the Winona State 21-yard line before turning the ball over on downs. Midway through the fourth quarter the Wildcats had a 38-yard touchdown pass to Zach Molacek called back on a penalty. Winona State closed out the scoring with 6:52 left in the game on a Wiese's fourth touchdown of the game, a 38-yard pass from quarterback Aaron Boettcher, to make the final score 31-3.

Winona State finished the game with 433 yards compared to Wayne State's 256. The Warriors were led offensively by Alex Wiese, who scored four touchdowns and had 161 yards of all-purpose yardage for the Warriors. He had 63 yards rushing on 12 carries with two scores and added another 98 yards receiving on six catches with two more scores. Quarterback Aaron Boettcher completed 17 of 30 passes for 271 yards with two touchdowns and one interception.

For Wayne State, Zach Molacek rushed for 58 yards on 13 carries in his final game in a Wildcat uniform. He finishes his career as the second all-time leading rusher in school history with 3,391 yards. Freshman quarterback Silas Fluellen completed 8 of 22 passes for 113 yards with one interception. The top receiver for WSC was Logan Masters with three receptions for 41 yards. WSC had 10 penalties in the game for 84 yards and had three turnovers in the game.

Founded in 1932, the Northern Intercollegiate Conference has enjoyed a varied existence in the upper Midwest region it calls home. In the spring of 1992, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) was formed out of the merger of the NIC, the men's conference, and the women's Northern Sun Conference (NSC). The NSC had existed since 1979. The NSIC is currently made up of institutions from Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North and South Dakota.

In the 1999-2000 academic year, the NSIC became an expanded 10-team league from a previous seven-member conference. The conference featured eight members from 2004-05 until 2005-06, but the league expanded to 10 teams in 2006-07 as the University of Mary in Bismarck, N.D. and Upper Iowa University in Fayette, Iowa joined the league.

Since 1932, various institutions have competed in the NSIC. Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University Moorhead and Winona State are charter members and have remained in the conference for the 74 years of its existence. The University of Minnesota Duluth, which departed following the 2003-04 season, was also an original member.

Other current members who joined in later years include Southwest Minnesota State University (1969), Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (Nebraska) in 1998, Concordia University-St. Paul and the University of Minnesota, Crookston in 1999 and the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006. The University of Minnesota Morris became a league member in 1966, however, the Cougars opted for the NCAA Division III ranks in 2003. Minnesota Morris ruled the NSIC in the mid-1970's, producing a record 34-game win streak. Charter members Minnesota State University Mankato and St. Cloud State University, along with later arrival Michigan Tech, added some colorful chapters to NSIC lore as well before moving to new leagues.



Before the NSIC became eligible for National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) championship competition in 1995, its member institutions had an extremely rich tradition in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The NIC's and NSC's tenure in the NAIA included several national championship teams and individuals as well as many national qualifiers.

Since 2000, the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference has participated in the only officially-sanctioned NCAA Division II football bowl game in the country. With a rich history dating back to 1948, the Mineral Water Bowl is hosted by the Quarterback Club of Excelsior Springs, Missouri. The game matches the highest-finishing team from the NSIC not selected for the NCAA Division II playoffs against the highest-finishing team from the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) not participating in the NCAA Division II playoffs. Now in its 41st year, the first game was played on Thanksgiving Day, 1948. The first MIAA/NSIC meeting in 2000 marked the Mineral Water Bowl's inaugural year of the Division II era with Winona State defeating Missouri Western State 43-41 in triple overtime.

Over the years the NSIC, comprised of schools of modest size, has provided extremely competitive intercollegiate athletic programs for its members. Although the programs are not designed to be equal to Division I athletics, many former NSIC athletes have distinguished themselves in national and international competition. Each member school emphasizes the educational, entertainment and unifying values of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. As some affiliated with the conference have coined, the NSIC quite possibly is, "the most competitive conference in NCAA Division II."

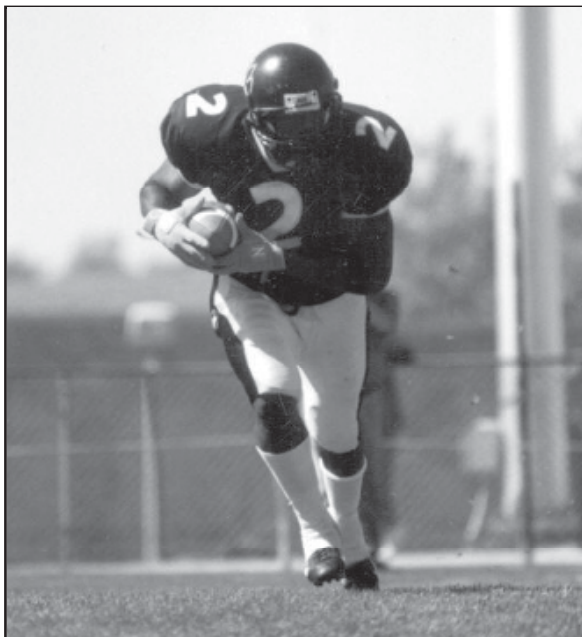

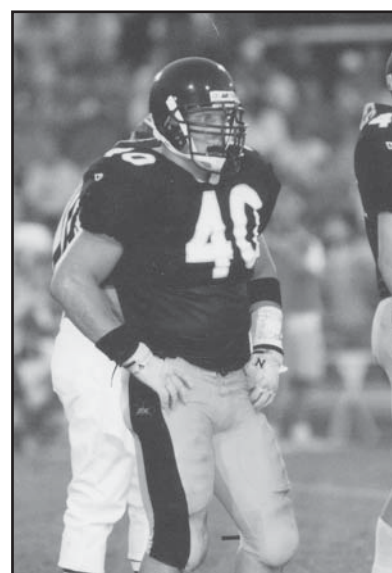
