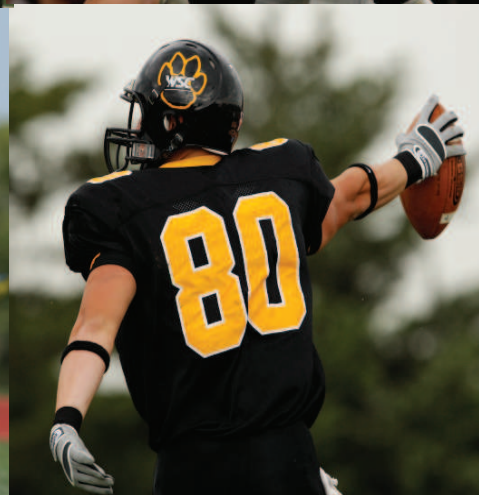

MEDIA INFORMATION



MEDIA GUIDELINES

CREDENTIALS

Requests for press, radio, photography and television credentials should be made one week prior to the game to insure seating in the press box. Requests should be directed to Sports Information Director Mike Grosz. Only members of the working media will be issued credentials.

Credentials may be picked up at the will-call window, located at the west entrance to Cunningham Field. Credentials must be visible at all times.

RADIO

A visitor's radio booth, equipped with a courtesy phone line, is available on the upper level of the press box. Radio stations should contact the Sports Information Office a week before the game to receive broadcast information.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographers must follow all NCAA and WSC regulations concerning access to the sidelines. *Photographers are not allowed in the team boxes.*

PARKING

Limited space is available in a reserved parking lot located behind the west side of Cunningham Field. Contact the Sports Information Office for parking availability.

WEEKLY INTERVIEWS

WSC coaches and players will be available for interviews Monday through Thursday, except between 1:30-6 p.m. Interview requests should be made through the Sports Information Office.

POST GAME INTERVIEWS

After a brief "cooling off" period, WSC players and coaches will be available for post game interviews. Players will be available outside the WSC locker room, located on the lower level of the Recreation Center, directly west of Memorial Stadium. Coach McLaughlin will meet with the media in the upper level of the Recreation Center following his radio show. Interview requests with WSC players will be taken toward the end of the game.

STATISTICS

A complete package of pre-game notes, depth charts and statistics will be available. Halftime and quarter statistics will also be provided.

Final statistics, including a play-by-play, will be distributed approximately 20 minutes after the game in the upper level of the Recreation Center.

Founded in 1891 as Nebraska Normal College, Wayne State College, in Wayne, Neb. earned a distinguished reputation as a teachers' college from its early days. We're still a great teachers' college—but so much more!

Innovative Programs

Wayne State's four academic schools—Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Counseling, and Natural and Social Sciences—offer a comprehensive selection of courses. You'll find 80 majors and minors ranging from pre-professional studies to criminal justice to a nationally accredited undergraduate sports management program, and many others in 14 academic departments across campus.

The Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) at Wayne State College provides pre-professional training in medicine, pharmacy and dentistry in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Medical Center. Students who successfully complete the program at WSC are automatically accepted into medical, pharmacy, or dental school at UNMC.

Thinking of teaching? Upper-level education majors at Wayne State have the opportunity to participate in the Northeast Nebraska Teacher Academy (NENTA), the first of its kind in the nation, where WSC students receive classroom experience with participating K-12 schools in the region.

Through WSC WebCat On-line, students can register for class, check on grades and student accounts, from the convenience of their home or residence hall room.

Excellent Career Preparation

Whether students plan to be an accountant or a wildlife biologist, they receive the preparation they need at Wayne State College. In addition to classes taught by experts in their fields, Wayne State College provides internship and cooperative programs for students in a number of majors. Many regional businesses actively recruit Wayne State students for internships, with many of these internships resulting in full-time employment after graduation.

The WSC Career Services office assists students with career exploration, job preparation skills, interviews, as well as arranging internships and cooperative experiences.

Personal Attention

Students at Wayne State College don't get lost in the crowd. With an average class size of 21 and a student/faculty ratio of 19:1, WSC students get to know their professors and classmates. Eighty percent of Wayne State professors have the highest degree in their field—and most teach



first-year as well as upper-level classes. You will find dedicated professors and instructors at Wayne State College: teaching is their life's work, and their enthusiasm is contagious.

Wayne State College offers a variety of support services and programs to students. The heart of the WSC campus is the Student Center, where academic and personal support services are located. The Learning Center and Peer Tutoring Program are designed to help all students achieve the highest possible level of success in their studies.

Active Campus Life

With more than 85 clubs and organizations on campus, Wayne State College students have many opportunities to be involved in campus and community life.

Wayne State College has an active Greek life, with Greek Olympics being held at Homecoming each fall, as well as other social and service activities. The Student Activities Board (SAB) plans a variety of special programs each year, bringing musical groups such as Vertical Horizon, Five for Fighting, Goo Goo Dolls, Sawyer Brown, Blackhawk, Dierks Bentley, Jason Aldean, Firehouse, and others to campus. Comedian Adam Sandler and other national performers have performed on campus.

The Multicultural Center, one of the newest campus programs, provides outreach and support to Wayne State College students and the region through special events during the year.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball and track, cross country, men's baseball, women's softball, men's and women's golf, and women's soccer. Wayne State has hosted NCAA North Central Regional Championships in cross country (2003 and 2006), the Northern Sun Conference Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic and the Northern Sun Conference baseball and track and field championships.

Scenic Surroundings

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Student Center, Studio Arts Building and Connell Hall. Ramsey Theatre underwent a state-of-the-art renovation in 2002. A new state-of-the-art indoor track was completed in the summer of 2001 in the WSC Recreation Center.

Wayne State College's seven residence halls provide students with a comfortable, affordable and convenient place to live with easy access to the entire campus community. Each hall has lounges and recreation areas, laundry facilities, mail service, academic tutors and study areas. Six of the seven halls are wired for access to the campus computer network from your personal computer. Smoke-free residence halls are also an option.





WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Richard Collings *President*

Dr. Richard Collings is in his fifth year as the 11th president of Wayne State College. Prior to assuming the presidency of Wayne State, Collings was vice chancellor for academic affairs and professor of political science and public affairs at Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, North Carolina, a position he held from 1996-2004. At Western Carolina, he led many academic and administration initiatives, including creating a residential honors college, developing technology partnerships with other institutions throughout the nation and implementing a strategic planning process.

From 1991-96, Collings was provost and vice president for academic affairs at Kutztown University of Pennsylvania, where he had served as dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences from 1989-91. Previously, he was assistant provost and chairperson of the department of political science at Southeast Missouri State in Cape Girardeau, Mo.

A native of Louisville, Ky., Collings earned a Ph.D. in political science in 1977 and a master's degree in Latin American studies in 1972, both from Tulane University. He received a bachelor's degree in international studies from the University of Louisville in 1968.

President Collings and his wife, Marilyn, have three grown children: Michael, Kristen and Kelly. They also have four grandchildren, Ethan, Kai, Noah and Olivia.



Eric Schoh *Director of Athletics*

Entering his fifth year as athletic director, Eric Schoh has injected enthusiasm and success into the Wildcat athletic department.

Wayne State College placed second in the 2007-08 Northern Sun Conference All-Sports Standings by winning two conference championships (baseball and men's outdoor track and field). 11 of the school's 15 sports finished in the top three of their respective sport in the NSIC while three teams (volleyball, women's basketball and baseball) also qualified for NCAA post-season competition.

"Everyone associated with Wildcat athletics should be proud of our accomplishments this past year," said Schoh. "The student-athletes, coaches, campus community and people of Wayne all had a hand in our success. It is a credit to the quality student-athletes we have at Wayne State when you are able to combine academic accomplishments with athletic success."

Prior to coming to Wayne State, Schoh was the associate athletic director for development at California State University in Bakersfield, Calif. from 2002-2004. From 1998-2002, Schoh was associate director of athletics at the University of South Dakota. He was the regional director of D.D. Marketing Inc. in Pueblo, Colorado from 1997-98 and was the assistant director of athletics

at Montana State University in Billings, Montana from 1995-97.

Schoh earned his master's degree in education from Iowa State University. He earned his bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communications from Iowa State University as well.

Schoh is a native of LaCrescent, Minnesota. He and his wife, Stephanie, have three children: Paige, Eric and Tyler.



Mike Barry *Assistant Director of Athletics*

Mike Barry is in his ninth year as associate director of athletics. Barry is also in his 11th year as the director of sports and recreational facilities. His duties include scheduling athletic contests and practices, home game management and serving as the athletic and recreational facilities' coordinator.

Barry was the Wayne State women's basketball head coach for seven seasons. He compiled a 97-92 record, which is second all-time on the school's career victory list. His best team was the 1993-94 squad which posted a 22-5 record.

Barry came to Wayne State following two years as an assistant women's basketball coach at Pratt Community College in Kansas. He also coached at Chadron State, Eastern New Mexico University, and Fullerton and Stuart high schools in Nebraska.

Barry, a native of Grant, Neb., was a four-sport athlete at Chadron State. He was a three-time NAIA national qualifier in the triple jump, and also lettered in basketball, football, and cross country.

Barry earned his Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education from Chadron State in 1983 and earned his Master's Degree in Secondary Education in 1988. He and his wife, Jeannette, have two sons, Jordan, 16, and Jalen, 13. Barry also has a son Rick, who lives in Crawford, Nebraska.



Shawn Pearcy *Faculty Athletic Representative*

Dr. Shawn Pearcy is in his fifth year as Faculty Athletic Representative at Wayne State College. Pearcy, an associate professor in the Life Sciences Department, is in his 11th year teaching at the school.

An Indiana native, Pearcy attended Purdue University and Indiana University, earning his bachelors degree from Indiana University in 1989. While an undergraduate, he participated in crew, ultimate and lacrosse. Pearcy attended graduate school at Washington State University, completing his doctorate in Zoophysiology in 1996. He enjoys teaching general biology, human physiology and vertebrae embryology at WSC. Pearcy is also a nationally-certified EMT and firefighter and serves on the Wayne Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field

Memorial Stadium has been "Home of the Wildcats" since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium following World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The press box was built at the time of the grandstand construction, with a second level being added in 1969.

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans. New bleachers were installed on the east side of the field in the fall of 2007 with seating for another 750 fans. Bob Cunningham Field has a natural grass surface.



Recreation Center

The Wayne State College Recreation Center opened in 1987 and is the college's main facility for student recreation and selected athletic activities.

The main area in the Recreation Center provides a six-lane running track and three full-size courts for basketball, volleyball, tennis, and badminton. The rec center running track was recently redone with one of the best surfaces in the world. Racquetball, weight training, aerobics, gymnastics, wrestling, and sauna facilities are all available to WSC students, faculty and staff as well as residents of the Wayne community.

The Recreation Center also houses locker rooms for Wildcat athletic teams, and offices for the WSC athletic department.

Carlson Natatorium

Carlson Natatorium adjoins the Recreation Center and Rice Auditorium. The 25-yard long pool is used for a variety of functions, including lap swimming, aquasize classes, senior wellness aquasize classes, HHPS classes, intramural activities and athletic training rehabilitation exercises. The natatorium is open in the summer for use by athletic camps and Rec Center members.





WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Strength Training Complex

The Strength Training Complex at Wayne State is one of the finest equipped facilities in the Nebraska State College system.

The 2,400 square foot facility is located in Rice Auditorium. The additional facilities in Rice and the adjacent Recreation Center provide athletes with both space and a wide range of equipment necessary to address their diverse needs.

The strength and conditioning facilities have been carefully designed to maximize workout efficiency and effectiveness, and are furnished with newly purchased state-of-the-art equipment that complements the existing equipment. Athletes have access to 10,000 pounds of free weights. Also included are three Olympic/Power lifting platforms; a large dumbbell area with adjustable benches; dumbbells ranging from ten to 120 lbs and a full range of various sized plyometric boxes.

Additionally, six power squat cages with adjustable benches allow each station to be a self-contained power area. Each station allows an athlete to squat, bench press, incline bench press, power clean, and push press, allowing flexibility according to the traffic demands and needs of the athletes. All lifting movements take place within the safely contained confines of a self-spotting power cage.



Pete Chapman Baseball & Softball Complex

The baseball and softball complex opened in the spring of 1996. Located north of Memorial Stadium, the complex provides a picturesque setting for baseball and softball games. The complex was necessary after the previous softball field was converted into a parking lot. In addition, the baseball team played its games off campus at the local American Legion field.

The baseball field received a facelift in the summer of 2004 with the additions of locker rooms, restrooms, a concession stand and press box. A new wood fence was installed on the baseball field prior to the start of the 2005 season.

In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex in honor of the late athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department. In the fall of 2006, a locker room/press box was built at the softball field. A new 10-inning scoreboard was placed at the baseball field in the fall of 2007 in right-center field.



Rice Auditorium

Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad. Recent upgrades to the arena include: new balcony seats and new stage curtain in the summer of 2007; a new playing surface in 2004; new scoreboards on the north and south walls (summer of 1998) and new bleachers in the lower level (summer of 1996).

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College's president from 1951-'56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships and the 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic.



ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



Muffin Morris
Head Athletic Trainer

Muffin Morris is in her first year at Wayne State College as the head athletic trainer. She will oversee athletic training responsibilities for 15 varsity sports at Wayne State College.

Before coming to Wayne State, Morris served four years at the University of South Dakota. She served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and worked with football, softball, swimming/diving, track/cross country and volleyball programs at USD.

The Chariton, Iowa native earned her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University in athletic training in 2004. Morris then obtained her master's degree from the University of South Dakota in 2006 in health, physical education and recreation and recently earned her doctorate degree in adult/higher education from the University of South Dakota on July 31, 2008.

Morris is serving as the head trainer for the Wildcat football team this fall and resides in Wayne.



Dr. Steven Stokesbary
Team Orthopedist

Dr. Steven Stokesbary enters his seventh season as Wayne State's team orthopedist.

Dr. Stokesbary is a partner in The Center for Neurosciences, Orthopaedics, and Spine Sports Medicine, P.C. (CNOS) in Dakota Dunes, South Dakota. He graduated from the University of Iowa and earned his medical degree also from the University of Iowa College of Medicine, after which he completed his residency at the University of Missouri Health Services.

Dr. Stokesbary has been practicing for CNOS Sports Medicine for over seven years, which provides athletic training services for over 40 area high schools, colleges and professional organizations.

Athletic Training Room

The Athletic Training Room is the site of taping, treatment and injury evaluations. It has a variety of up to date, quality equipment. A partial inventory of modalities available for athletes include: three whirlpools, RichMar Theratouch 7.7 electrical stimulation machine, RichMar HV-II combination ultrasound/electrical stimulation machine, RichMar portable ultrasound machine, Game-ready intermittent compression machine, Therabath Parafin machine, and Hydrocollator heat pack units. The athletic training room also has three computers.

PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center

The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center, which opened December 1, 2005, is a 4,000 square foot state-of-the-art facility. The center is located next to the Wayne State College Recreation Center and serves as the hub for therapy and athletic training services.

In August 2007, Providence Physical Therapy and Wayne State College collaborated to provide therapy services at the PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center. This partnership provides the finest in sports rehabilitation, therapy services and athletic training services to Wayne State student-athletes, the campus community and the general public.

Providence Physical Therapy offers physical, occupational and speech therapy services and is staffed by six physical therapists, two physical therapy assistants, two occupational therapists and one speech therapist. Providence Physical Therapy staff also provides aquatic therapy at the Carlson Natatorium.

Dedicated to excellence and quality care, the PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center athletic training staff and Providence Physical Therapy staff is committed to the health and wellness of WSC students, faculty and the Wayne community.





HEAD COACH DAN MCLAUGHLIN



Dan McLaughlin enters his fourth season as head football coach at Wayne State College. In his three seasons at WSC, McLaughlin has turned a struggling football program into a winner. The Wildcats posted a 7-5 overall record in 2007, the first winning season by a WSC football team since 1995. Wayne State finished second place in the Northern Sun Conference with a 7-2 league mark

despite a predicted fifth place finish in the NSIC preseason poll. It was the best-ever finish in conference play for the Wildcat football team since joining the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference in 1999 and resulted in Coach McLaughlin being named the 2007 NSIC Football Coach of the Year.

The Wildcats' second place finish in the NSIC resulted in just the second-ever post season bowl appearance in 91 years of football for the school as Wayne State represented the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference in the Mineral Water Bowl played in Excelsior Springs, Missouri on December 1, 2007. Other milestones accomplished in the 2007 season under McLaughlin included the school's first six-game win streak on the gridiron since 1993 and the first regional ranking (10th in the Northwest Region) for a Wildcat football team since 1993 when WSC was ranked as high as fourth in the former Midwest Region.

McLaughlin has guided Wayne State to a 16-18 overall record and a 15-9 mark in the Northern Sun Conference during his three seasons as head coach of the Wildcats. Under McLaughlin in 2006, the Wildcats went 5-6 with three of the losses by a combined nine points. WSC recorded their first

three-game winning streak in football since 1995 during the 2006 campaign and posted back-to-back shutout wins for the first time since the 1976 season. Also serving as offensive line coach, the Wildcats allowed an NSIC-low two sacks in league play under the coaching of McLaughlin in the 2006 season. WSC amassed a 4-7 mark under McLaughlin in his first season at the school in 2005 and the teams' 4-3 mark in the NSIC that season was the school's first-ever winning mark in football since joining the league.

Dan McLaughlin was hired as the 21st head football coach at Wayne State College on Dec. 9, 2004. He came to Wayne State after spending one season as offensive coordinator at Minnesota State in Mankato, Minnesota where he helped the Mavericks to a 6-5 record in 2004 after the team went 0-11 in 2003. It was Minnesota State's first winning season in football since 1994. He also served as offensive line coach with the Mavericks under head coach Jeff Jamrog. In 2003, McLaughlin was a graduate assistant coach at the University of Nebraska, working as an assistant offensive line coach and assistant special teams coach while coordinating Nebraska's walk-on program.

Before moving to the college ranks, McLaughlin achieved success at the high school level in Nebraska by winning state championships at three different schools. He was the head coach at Millard West from 1995 to 2002, guiding the Wildcats to seven consecutive playoff appearances. His 2001 team went 12-1 and captured the Class A state title. McLaughlin was the head coach at Norfolk High School from 1988 to 1994, leading the Panthers to the Class A state title in 1994. McLaughlin also coached at Broken Bow High School in 1987 and led the school to the Class B state crown in his only season at Broken Bow.

Believed to be the only head coach in Nebraska high school football history to win state titles at three different schools, McLaughlin compiled a high school coaching record of 110-59.

McLaughlin earned his master's degree from Wayne State College in 1992. He is a native of Sheridan, Montana and is a 1982 graduate of Bellevue College. Dan and his wife Nadine have two sons, Scott and Sean, and reside in Wayne, Neb.



WILDCAT ASSISTANT COACHES



Clint Brown
Defensive Coordinator

Clint Brown is in his fourth season at Wayne State College as the team's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator. In his first three seasons as the Wildcats' defensive coordinator, Brown has helped the WSC defense move up the NSIC defensive statistical categories.

Under Brown, the WSC defense led the NSIC in sacks during the 2007 season with 37 and ranked second in the league in pass defense, allowing just 207.5 yards per game as the Wildcats finished with a 7-5 record, the first winning season for a WSC football team since the 1995 season. The Wildcats posted back-to-back shutouts in 2006 (28-0 at Minnesota, Crookston and 7-0 vs. Northern State) for the first time since 1976.

Brown comes to Wayne State from New Mexico State, where he was a defensive backs coach for two years. Prior to coaching at New Mexico State, Brown was a defensive coordinator at Bethel College in North Newton, Kansas. He also served as the team's recruiting coordinator and academic coordinator for the football program. While at Bethel College, the team posted an 8-2 record.

Before moving to Bethel College, Brown served as a graduate assistant at New Mexico State where he coached the linebackers and the secondary. Prior to New Mexico State, he served as a graduate assistant at University of Nebraska-Omaha (1996, defensive ends) and an assistant at Nebraska Wesleyan (1995, linebackers).

Brown earned two letters as a member of the Nebraska Cornhusker program. He was a member of the 1994 National Championship team that went 13-0, including a 24-17 win over Miami (FL) in the FedEx Orange Bowl. Brown also played in the 1993 FedEx Orange Bowl.

Brown received his Bachelor's Degree from the University of Nebraska in 1996 and earned his Master's Degree from New Mexico State University in 1999. A native of Arlington, Nebraska, Clint and his wife Stephanie reside in Wayne with their infant daughter Ava Michelle Brown, born January 4, 2008.



Gene Suhr
Offensive Coordinator

Gene Suhr is in his second season on the Wildcat football coaching staff, serving as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Wayne State's offense posted some impressive numbers in Suhr's first season in charge of the Wildcat offense.

WSC ranked second in the NSIC in total offense, averaging 409.6 yards per game. The Wildcats racked up 626 yards of total offense in a wild 48-44 win at Concordia-St. Paul on October 27, 2007, marking the first time WSC gained more than 600 yards in a single game since the 1999 season. One week earlier, the 'Cats accounted for 567 yards in a 42-28 win over Southwest Minnesota State, marking the first time since

2003 that a WSC football team gained more than 500 yards in a single game.

Suhr comes to Wayne State after coaching 23 seasons at Papillion-LaVista High School, posting an impressive 174-74 mark as Monarchs' coach. He won Class A State Championships in 1990 and 1996 while earning state runner up finishes in 1985, 1995 and 1997. His overall high school coaching record was 200-95.

The University of Nebraska-Omaha graduate started his coaching career at Omaha Gross, where he served three seasons as an assistant coach. Suhr was named head coach at Ord High School in 1979 and compiled a 26-21 mark before being named head coach at Papillion-LaVista High School.



Alex Wood
Special Teams / Def. Backs

Alex Wood begins his first season as a member of the Wayne State College football coaching staff, serving as defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator. He also serves as equipment coordinator for all 15 sports at Wayne State College.

The 1996 graduate of Winston-Salem State in North Carolina comes to Wayne State after spending two seasons at Nebraska-Omaha where he was special teams coordinator and coached the defensive line after working with outside linebackers in the spring of 2006. Before that, Wood coached two seasons (20004 and 2005) as secondary coach, special teams coach and video coordinator at East Stroudsburg University in Pennsylvania. He then coached one season at Hillside High School in Durham, North Carolina (2003-04) and was at Livingstone College in 2002.

Wood also coached at Minnesota State in Mankato, Minnesota from 1999-2002, serving as the team's defensive line coach and special team coordinator. He served one season as an assistant coach at Morgan State University (1998) and James Madison University (1997) and began his extensive coaching career at Lexington Senior High School (North Carolina) in 1996.

Alex has two children, a son (Aaron) and a daughter (Alexis) and resides in Wayne.



Tim Triplett
Wide Receivers

Tim Triplett is in his second season with the Wayne State College football coaching staff, serving as a graduate assistant coach working with wide receivers.

Triplett played wide receiver at the University of South Dakota from 2001-05. He was elected team captain and Special Teams Player of the Year in 2005 for the Coyotes. He earned his bachelor degree from the University of South Dakota in contemporary media and journalism. Tim is a native of Iowa City, Iowa and is working towards a masters degree in sport management at Wayne State College.

Scott McLaughlin
Defensive Line

Scott McLaughlin is in his second season as a graduate assistant football coach at Wayne State College, working with the defensive linemen. He also served as a student assistant at UNO and served as the team's video coordinator for three seasons before

coming to Wayne State College.

In high school, Scott earned Class A All-State honors at Millard West after recording 11 sacks and 19 tackles for loss as a senior to earn honorary captain honors on the Class A All-State Defensive Team.

McLaughlin, who earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Nebraska-Omaha in continuing education, is working on his master's degree at Wayne State College in sport management and resides in Wayne.

2008 SEASON OUTLOOK



After recording the school's first winning season on the gridiron since 1995, the Wayne State College football team is hungry for more of the success the team enjoyed in the 2007 season. The Wildcats finished 7-5 overall and posted a 7-2 record in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference, good for a second place finish and a berth in the Mineral Water Bowl last season. It was the just the second post-season appearance for a Wayne State football team in the program's 92-year history and even though the Wildcats lost a hard-fought 20-13 battle to Missouri Western in the Mineral Water Bowl, fourth-year head coach Dan McLaughlin says the team wants to taste more of the success from the 2007 season.

"We've had the best off-season and conditioning since we've been here and it's a direct result of the Mineral Water Bowl appearance," commented McLaughlin, who was named the 2007 NSIC Coach of the Year. "When you get a taste of something you haven't had before, you want more of it. Even though we lost the bowl game, the kids got that taste of something they haven't had before and they now want more."

The Wildcats return 18 of 22 starters on offense and defense, so experience is one key component heading into the 2008 season. Offensively, the Wildcats need to replace three starters on the offensive line. Lost to graduation are center Jay Winter and starting right tackle Scott Umphenour while starting right guard Brian Locke left school. WSC does return three-year starter Brian Okonofua, a Second Team All-Northwest Region selection last fall, at left guard and two-year starter Brandon Carlson at left tackle. Sophomore Shane Winter started several games at right tackle last season and will be called on to help fill voids in the offensive line along with junior Jake Runyon and sophomores Joe Bundy and B.J. Lambrecht. Former tight end Collin Prosser,

a senior from Vermillion, S.D., moves to the offensive line this season and will also contend for playing time in the trenches.



Junior Silas Fluellen (**pictured left**) returns as the Wildcats' starting quarterback after throwing for 2,828 yards and 21 touchdowns last season, completing 216 of 381 passes (56.7%). He was tabbed the NSIC South Division Preseason Offensive Player of the Year after putting up solid numbers last season as a sophomore.

Senior running back Travis Rhone rushed for 1,013 yards last season with 13 touchdowns, averaging 4.8 yards per carry to become just the seventh back in school history to surpass the 1,000-yard mark. Junior speedster Eric Meyer (Logan View HS) had a strong second half to last season and rushed for 266 yards with four TD's while averaging 6.5 yards per carry and adds depth at the running back position.



Junior wide receiver Logan Masters (Storm Lake, Iowa) became just the sixth wideout to surpass 1,000 yards receiving last season when he hauled in a team-high 64 receptions for 1,097 yards and six touchdowns. Masters (**pictured left**) has caught at least two passes in all 23 games he has played in his first two seasons with the Wildcats. 2007 NSIC Offensive Newcomer of the Year Frederick Bruno added 38 receptions for 567 yards and five scores while senior Brian Chapman added a career-high 37 receptions for 468 yards and five touchdowns and brings leadership to the receivers group.

Senior running back Travis Rhone added 29 catches for 247 yards out of the backfield while sophomore Robert Perry played an increased role with Wildcat receivers at the end of last season and finished with 21 catches for 221 yards and one touchdown as a true freshman.



2008 SEASON OUTLOOK



At tight end/H-back, Creighton junior Aaron Nielsen switched from linebacker to tight end late last season and has impressed coaches with his versatility. Nielsen caught a touchdown pass in the Mineral Water Bowl last season for his only catch of the season.

On defense, the Wildcats return 10 of 11 starters but the one player lost to graduation is a big one. Middle linebacker Nick Baldetti was the team's leading tackler last season with 115 tackles, earning First Team All-NSIC and Second Team All-Northwest Region honors. Defensive coordinator Clint Brown says junior Ryan Reeves looked good in spring ball and has separated himself as the #1 contender at middle linebacker. Wakefield junior Kyle Gardner and redshirt freshman Josh Prokavec (Clarkson) provide quality depth at the middle linebacker position.

At outside linebacker, the Wildcats return starters Luke Hoffman and Reno Blomquist. Hoffman (**pictured right**) is a three-year starter and was the team's second leading tackler last season with 90 tackles while Blomquist finished tied for fifth in tackles with 68.

The defensive line, labeled as the strength of the defense, returns all four starters, led by First Team All-NSIC senior defensive end Troy Pribnow (Scribner-Snyder) and 2007 NSIC Defensive Newcomer of the Year Darius Davis. Pribnow (**pictured above center**) ranked fourth on the team in tackles with 69 and recorded a team-high 12 sacks and 20.5 tackles for loss last season. Davis, a senior, accounted for 62 tackles and had 7.5 sacks to go with 11 tackles for loss. Pierce senior Tyler Krueger and Battle Creek senior Chris Barry also return as

starters on the interior front. Krueger amassed 68 tackles and ranked second on the team in sacks (9.5) and tackles for loss (16) while Barry started 11 games and recorded 28 tackles with three sacks.



The secondary also returns all four starters in safeties Matt Greenway and B.J. Campbell along with cornerbacks Benny Collins, Robert Manuel and Javal Jones. Greenway, a junior from Lincoln Pius, totaled 78 tackles to rank third on the team to go with two interceptions while Campbell, a senior from Vermillion, S.D., had a team-high four interceptions along with seven pass breakups. Stanton junior Ryan Molacek appeared in only two games last season due to injury and adds depth to the secondary along with Cole Fischer of Leigh, who started seven games last season.



On special teams, South Sioux City sophomore Jacob Bell has been featured as the team's top punter and is becoming more consistent with his kicks, getting more height and distance after averaging 29.0 yards per punt on eight attempts in a backup role last season. Junior placekicker Nick Hope made 6 of 8 field goals and converted on 40 of 43 PAT kicks last season and returns as the top kicker. Sophomore Frederick Bruno was one of the top kickoff returners in the NSIC last season, averaging 20.5 yards per return that included an 86 yard TD return vs. MSU Moorhead.

Wayne State opens the 2008 season at Nebraska-Kearney on Saturday, August 30 followed by the Wildcats' home opener vs. MSU Moorhead on Saturday, September 6 at Cunningham Field in Wayne.

GAME 1 - #5 Chadron State 55, Wayne State 14 Sept. 1, 2007 * Elliott Field * Chadron, Neb.

NCAADivision II 5th-ranked Chadron State used a balanced offensive attack to roll up 467 yards of total offense in a 55-14 win over Wayne State Saturday afternoon in the Wildcats' season opener played in Chadron, Nebraska. CSC moves to 2-0 with the win while dropping Wayne State to 0-1.

The Eagles opened the scoring early in the game as Craig Kaiser scooped up a fumble on Wayne State's third play from scrimmage and scampered 47 yards for a score, putting CSC ahead 7-0 with 14:24 left in the first quarter. Later in the quarter, Danny Woodhead, the 2006 Harlon Hill Trophy winner as Division II's top player, scored on a one-yard run to put the Eagles ahead 14-0 after the first quarter.

Wayne State answered with a 14-play, 86 yard drive as junior running back Travis Rhone scored from five yards out with 13:22 left in the second quarter, making the score 14-7. But Chadron State used two more scores in the second quarter, a Mark Haag eight-yard run and a Danny Woodhead five-yard run, to put the Eagles in front 27-7 at halftime.

The lone score of the third quarter was a one-yard run by CSC quarterback Joe McLain at the 11:00 minute mark, making the score 34-7. McLain added another score, an 11-yard run, early in the fourth quarter, to give the Eagles a commanding 41-7 lead. The Wildcats responded as, on the ensuing drive, Logan Masters made an acrobatic catch against two CSC defenders and then rambled 80 yards for a score with 12:08 left in the game to make the score 41-14. Aaron Cooksley's 14-yard run and an 11-yard pass from Zac Zandstra to Tyler Watson closed out the scoring for Chadron State to make the final score 55-14.

Chadron State finished with 467 yards of total offense while Wayne State gained 450 yards in the contest. Sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen completed 16 of 26 passes for 237 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Junior running back Travis Rhone had a solid debut in a Wildcat uniform with 103 yards rushing on 22 carries and one score. Sophomore Logan Masters was the top receiver for Wayne State with four catches for 154 yards and one touchdown. Defensively, Ryan Molacek led Wayne State with seven tackles followed by Benny Collins and Nick Baldetti with six apiece.

For Chadron State, Woodhead finished the game with just 104 yards rushing on 16 carries with two touchdowns along with four receptions for 99 yards. Quarterback Joe McLain completed 11 of 17 passes for 190 yards.

For 1-1 UNK, it was the 10th straight win by the Lopers over the Wildcats on the gridiron, while Wayne State slipped to 0-2 on the season.

After holding UNK to a three and out on their first series, Wayne State got the ball and scored on their second play from scrimmage as sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen found Brian Chapman on a 68-yard scoring play, giving the Wildcats a 7-0 lead with 12:31 left in the first quarter. UNK scored on the ensuing drive as the Lopers marched 59 yards on 10 plays, capped on a one-yard run by quarterback Dennis Havrilla with 8:05 left in the first quarter, to tie the score at 7-7.

The Lopers then used a pair of trick plays in the second quarter to take control of the game. Eric Myrick delivered a 46-yard scoring strike to Cory Sleeth on a fake reverse/pass to put UNK in front 14-7 with 14:47 remaining in the second quarter. Later in the quarter, Geoff Carnahan booted a 24-yard field goal at the 7:28 mark to give UNK a 17-7 lead. The final trick play happened late in the first half as Carnahan executed a 14 yard pass to Tyler McNitt on a fake field goal attempt, extending the UNK lead to 24-7 with 3:21 left in the first half.

The lone score in the second half came with 7:14 left in the game as McNitt was on the receiving end of a 15-yard pass from Dennis Havrilla to cap an eight-play, 70 yard drive to make the final score 31-7.

UNK out-yarded Wayne State 451-215 in the contest. The Lopers had 275 yards rushing and 176 passing while WSC was held to just 32 yards rushing and 215 yards passing. Jake Richards led a balanced rushing attack for UNK with 99 yards on 17 carries. Loper quarterback Dennis Havrilla completed 9 of 16 passes for 109 yards with one interception and one touchdown.

For Wayne State, sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen completed 16 of 29 passes for 170 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. Travis Rhone was the leading rusher for WSC with 42 yards on 15 carries. Defensively, senior linebacker Nick Baldetti recorded 17 tackles (five solo, 12 assisted) with Matt Greenway adding three solo and 10 assists for 13 total tackles.

Wayne State built a 27-7 lead, then held off a late Upper Iowa rally, as the Wildcats hung on for a 34-28 win at Upper Iowa in Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference football Saturday afternoon in Fayette, Iowa. WSC improved to 1-2 overall and 1-0 in the NSIC while UIU slipped to 1-2 overall and 0-1 in league play.

The Wildcats scored on their first three possessions of the game to take a 17-0 lead in the first quarter. Silas Fluellen found the endzone on a two-yard run on the opening series that covered 69 yards on seven plays to put WSC ahead 7-0 with 12:20 left in the first quarter. Nick Hope added a 23-yard field goal on the next series, highlighted by a Travis Rhone 56-yard run, to put the 'Cats in front 10-0 with 8:52 remaining in the opening stanza. Later in the quarter the 'Cats got the ball back following an interception by B.J. Campbell and Fluellen tossed a two-yard scoring pass to sophomore tight end Brian Locke to increase the Wildcat lead to 17-0 with 1:45 left in the first quarter.

Following a scoreless second quarter, WSC opened the scoring in the third quarter on a Nick Hope 23-yard field goal, pushing the Wildcat lead to 20-0 with 6:34 left in the third quarter. Upper Iowa scored on the ensuing drive with Ryan Hudgins on the receiving end of a 21-yard scoring pass from Jay Lehman, making the score 20-7 with 4:21 remaining in the third quarter. WSC responded with a score later in the quarter as Fluellen and Locke hooked up for the second time in the game on a two-yard scoring play with 1:13 to go in the third quarter, giving WSC a 27-7 lead. But UIU scored the first of two touchdowns in a span of 53 seconds to start their rally. Lehman hit Allen Conrad on a 11-yard pass play with :16 seconds left in the third quarter and then TC Hicks broke loose on a 76-yard run with 14:37 remaining in the game, making the score 27-21.

Later in the quarter, WSC got the ball back and started a drive at the Upper Iowa 27-yard line following a 33-yard punt return by senior Nile Legania. The 'Cats drove 27 yards in seven plays with Fluellen finding Brian Chapman on an eight-yard scoring pass, putting WSC in front 34-21 with 5:59 left in the game. The Peacocks would not go away as Upper Iowa drove 68 yards on nine plays on the ensuing drive to cut the Wildcat lead down to six points at 34-28 as backup quarterback Kevin Linnell hit Kyle Hosch on a six-yard play with 2:35 left in the game. The Peacocks held WSC to a three and out and had the ball at their own 41-yard line with 1:17 left in the game. But the Wildcat defense stepped up as Darius Davis recorded a six-yard sack followed by three straight incomplete passes, giving WSC the ball back at the UIU 35 yard line and WSC ran out the clock to preserve the win.

UIU had one more yard in the game than Wayne State, 396-395. Sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen completed 20 of 32 passes for 218 yards with three touchdowns and one interception. Junior running back Travis Rhone accounted for 95 yards rushing on 17 carries. The top receiver was Logan Masters with five catches for 66 yards while Frederick Bruno added five receptions for 45 yards.

Defensively, Troy Pribnow, Matt Greenway and Nick Baldetti each finished with eight tackles. Pribnow had 3.5 tackles for loss while Greenway added an interception for 13 yards. Darius Davis added seven tackles, including two sacks for minus 16 yards.

GAME 4 - MSU Moorhead 48, Wayne State 18 Sept. 22, 2007 * Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

MSU Moorhead senior quarterback Dustin Long accounted for five touchdowns and 335 yards of total offense to lead the Dragons in a 42-18 win over Wayne State in Northern Sun Conference football played Saturday afternoon in Wayne, Nebraska. The visiting Dragons improved to 2-2 overall and 1-1 in the NSIC while dropping Wayne State to 1-3 overall and 1-1 in league play.

Long completed 16 of 24 passes for 209 yards with five touchdowns while also rushing for 126 yards on eight carries to lead a Dragon offense that accumulated 475 yards in the game while holding Wayne State to just 290 yards.

MSU Moorhead, who was averaging just 32.3 yards per game rushing, had two players surpass the 100 yard mark and finished the game with 271 yards rushing to go with 204 yards passing.

The Dragons opened the scoring with 8:20 remaining in the first quarter when running back Enol Gilles hit paydirt from eight yards out to give MSUM a 7-0 lead. WSC scored on the next drive as sophomore Nick Hope booted a 19-yard field goal, capping a 17-play, 62 yard drive that covered 7:58 to make the score 7-3.

In the second quarter, Dragon quarterback Dustin Long found Curtis Bedgood on a 35-yard pass play to give the Dragons a 14-3 lead. Long then found Bert Smith on a 45-yard pass later in the quarter, giving the Dragons a 21-3 lead with 7:20 left in the second quarter. WSC mounted a drive and moved the ball to the MSUM 9-yard line, but quarterback Silas Fluellen was sacked by MSU Moorhead's Trent Johnson, forcing a fumble that was recovered by Johnson and the Dragons to end the Wildcat scoring threat to keep the score 21-3 in favor of MSUM at halftime.

The second half saw MSU Moorhead score on their first two possessions to take a commanding 35-3 lead as Long found tight end Eric Eager on a nine-yard scoring pass followed by a 14-yard strike to Eric Green with 6:07 left in the third quarter.

WSC scored its first touchdown of the game early in the fourth quarter when Silas Fluellen hooked up with Logan Masters on a 28-yard scoring play, making the score 35-9 with 14:32 remaining in the game. The Wildcats added a safety at the 11:49 mark when MSU Moorhead punter Kyle Wilcox could not handle a snap deep in Dragon territory and the ball rolled through the end zone for a team safety. On the ensuing kickoff, WSC freshman Frederick Bruno bolted 86 yards on the kickoff return for a score to cut the Dragon lead to 35-18. MSUM added an insurance score on the next drive as Long tossed his fifth touchdown strike of the day, a 20-yard pass to Jabari Taylor, to make the final score 42-18.

For Wayne State, Silas Fluellen completed 21 of 39 passes for 218 yards with one touchdown and one interception. Travis Rhone had 65 yards rushing on 12 carries to lead the Wildcat rushing attack while Frederick Bruno had a game-high seven receptions for 37 yards followed by Logan Masters with four catches for 63 yards and one touchdown.

Defensively, senior linebacker Nick Baldetti paced Wayne State with 12 tackles followed by Luke Hoffman with eight. MSU Moorhead's top tackler was Jonathan Miller with 10 stops followed by Eric Schaumburg with eight.

Junior running back Travis Rhone scored three touchdowns and accounted for 206 all-purpose yards to lead Wayne State over Minnesota, Crookston 31-7 Saturday afternoon in the Homecoming/Hall of Fame game played at Cunningham Field in Wayne. It was the third straight homecoming win for the Wildcats, now 2-3 overall and 2-1 in the NSIC. UMC falls to 1-3 and 0-3 in league play.

Minnesota, Crookston had early plans on spoiling homecoming for the Wildcats as the Golden Eagles drove 46 yards on just three plays in the opening minute of the game to take a 7-0 lead when UMC quarterback David White snuck across the goal line from one yard out. Wayne State, though, responded by scoring on three straight possessions and four of their first five drives to take control of the game.

After UMC took the early 7-0 lead, WSC countered with a 10 play, 72 yard drive to tie the score at 7-7 when Travis Rhone scored on a five-yard run with 9:22 left in the first quarter. In the second quarter, WSC sophomore Nick Hope booted a 34-yard field goal into a steady south wind at 30 mph, putting the Wildcats ahead 24-7 at halftime.

The lone score of the second half came when the Wildcats blocked a UMC punt and recovered at the four yard line midway through the third quarter, Rhone hit paydirt on the following play on a four-yard run to make the final score 31-7.

GAME 6 - Wayne State 26, Northern State 24 Oct. 6, 2007 * Swisher Field * Aberdeen, S.D.

Wayne State College overcame four turnovers on the road to hang on for a 26-24 Northern Sun Conference win at Northern State in Aberdeen, South Dakota Saturday afternoon. With the win, Wayne State moved into a three-way tie for second place in the NSIC at 3-1 in the league and 3-3 overall while dropping Northern State to 2-4 overall and 2-2 in the NSIC. WSC is now 7-1 in NSIC road games under third year head coach Dan McLaughlin.

Wayne State opened the scoring midway through the first quarter after the Wildcats' defense forced a Northern State turnover with Tyler Krueger recovering the ball at the NSU 32 yard line. Sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen found Frederick Bruno on a 28-yard scoring play on a 4th and 17 from the Wolves' 28-yard line, giving WSC a 7-0 lead with 5:35 left in the first quarter. Northern State countered on the following drive as the Wolves marched 46 yards on five plays, capped by a 16-yard touchdown pass from Eric Ellingson to John Migdahl, evening the score at 7-7 with 3:04 to go in the first quarter.

Northern State used a WSC turnover to take a 10-7 lead later in the quarter as the Wolves intercepted a Silas Fluellen pass to get the ball at the Wildcat 20-yard line. Thomas Parrott booted a 38-yard field with 34 seconds remaining in the first quarter, giving the Wolves a 10-7 lead. Midway through the second quarter, Wayne State's Tanner Schacher blocked a Northern State punt, giving the Wildcats the ball at their own 47-yard line. The Wildcats drove inside the NSU one-yard line, but on third and goal WSC quarterback Silas Fluellen fumbled the ball as he lunged for the goal line and the Wolves recovered the ball in the end zone for a touchback to preserve their 10-7 lead entering halftime.

Early in the third quarter, WSC regained the lead thanks to a stellar 48-yard punt return by Nile Legania that gave WSC the ball at the Northern State 20-yard line. On the first play of the drive, backup quarterback Justin Happ, replacing a struggling Silas Fluellen, handed off to junior running back Travis Rhone, who scampered 20 yards for the score to put WSC in front 14-10 with 10:07 remaining in the third quarter. But again, Northern State responded on the ensuing drive to retake the lead as the Wolves grounded out a 14-play, 70 yard drive, using 7:35 of the clock to take a 17-14 lead after Ellingson connected with Brian Jark on a five-yard scoring play with 2:25 left in the third quarter.

WSC tied the score at 17-17 on the next drive as sophomore Nick Hope booted a 25-yard field goal with 12:40 to go in the fourth quarter. The Wildcats then took advantage of a bad snap by Northern State center Mike Zerr, bouncing the ball past quarterback Eric Ellingson, through the end zone for a team safety at the 10:16 mark, to take a 19-17 lead. Getting the ball back, the Wildcats took advantage and drove 44 yards for another score to take a 26-17 lead following a nine-yard run by Rhone, his second touchdown of the second half, with 6:12 remaining.

Northern State wouldn't go away as the Wolves took the ensuing drive and marched 57 yards on six plays, capped by a 13-yard run from Zain Gower, to cut the Wildcat lead to 26-24 with 4:34 to go in the game. WSC was forced to punt on their next drive, giving Northern State the ball at their own 37-yard line with 1:30 left in the game. But WSC junior linebacker Luke Hoffman preserved the Wildcat win by intercepting a Northern State pass with 50 seconds to go, giving WSC a 26-24 win.

WSC gained 258 yards of total offense while holding Northern State to just 198 yards, including 37 yards on the ground. It's the second straight week that WSC has held their opponent to under 200 yards of total offense. Rhone finished the game with 143 yards rushing on 21 carries with two touchdowns to lead the Wildcats offensively. Fluellen completed just 7 of 17 passes for 84 yards with two interceptions and one touchdown. Logan Masters was the top receiver for WSC with three receptions for 27 yards, marking the 17th straight game that Masters has recorded at least two catches in a game.

Defensively, junior defensive end Tyler Krueger had a game-high 11 tackles with eight solo stops, 4.5 tackles for losses totaling 11 yards, to go with a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

The host Beavers wasted little time getting on the scoreboard, taking the opening drive of the game and marching 64 yards on 10 plays to take a 7-0 lead following an Eric Newman two-yard scoring run with 10:38 to go in the first quarter. On Wayne State's first drive of the game, the 'Cats drove the ball to the Bemidji State five-yard line, but the Wildcats could not find the endzone and turned the ball back to the Beavers on downs. Later in the first quarter, the Wildcats moved the ball again deep into BSU territory, but sophomore placekicker Nick Hope missed wide right on a 29-yard field goal to give the Beavers the ball back at their own 20-yard line.

Wayne State's third opportunity inside the red zone midway through the second quarter would result in points as Silas Fluellen scored on a one-yard run to even the score at 7-7 with 4:05 left in the second quarter. The big play of the scoring drive was a 62-yard pass completion from Fluellen to Logan Masters. Bemidji State took the ensuing drive and moved the ball to the WSC 32 yard line, but Wildcat redshirt freshman cornerback Cole Fischer intercepted a pass by Bemidji State quarterback Cory Wardrope to thwart the Beaver scoring threat to make the halftime score 7-7.

Bemidji State took advantage of a Silas Fluellen fumble on the first play of the second half and turned the miscue into points as Beavers running back James Moore scored on a one-yard run with 12:03 to go in the third quarter, capping a seven-play, 58 yard drive to put Bemidji State back in front 14-7. Later in the third quarter, the Wildcats used a 10-play, 73 yard drive to set up Nick Hope on a 29-yard field goal, making the score 14-10 in favor of the Beavers with 5:16 remaining in the third quarter. Bemidji State would answer the Wildcats' score on the next drive, covering 63 yards on 10 plays to take a 21-10 lead early in the fourth quarter as Wardrope found tight end John Larson on a 10-yard scoring pass on the first play of the fourth quarter to put the Beavers ahead by 11 points.

Wayne State began their comeback midway through the fourth quarter as the Wildcats needed just four plays and 42 yards to score, capped by an eight-yard touchdown pass from Fluellen to Brian Chapman, making the score 21-17 with 8:59 remaining. The Wildcat defense stopped Bemidji State on back-to-back drives, giving Wayne State the ball at their own 33 yard line with 2:05 left in the game. Fluellen engineered a 10-play, 67 yard drive in the final two minutes of the game to account for the go-ahead score as the sophomore quarterback from Bellevue West found Frederick Bruno on a seven-yard scoring play with just 42 seconds left in the game, giving WSC a 24-21 lead.

Bemidji State had one last chance, starting at their own 39-yard line. But Wildcat junior Reno Blomquist intercepted a Cory Wardrope pass at the Wildcat 18-yard line to preserve the come-from-behind win.

Fluellen had a career-high 349 yards passing to lead the Wayne State offense in the win, completing 24 of 38 passes with two touchdowns and one interception. His previous career-high of 325 yards came against Bemidji State in Wayne last season. His favorite receiver was sophomore Logan Masters with seven receptions for 178 yards, a career-high in receiving yards for Masters. Brian Chapman added six catches for 58 yards and one touchdown.

"We're real excited with the win and happy with how the kids responded when we needed them to," commented WSC offensive coordinator Gene Suhr following the game. "We knew they (Bemidji State) were vulnerable to the pass. Silas was on throwing the ball today and the offensive line did a great job allowing Silas to set up and throw the ball."

WSC had 387 yards of total offense in the game to Bemidji State's 315. Junior defensive end Tyler Krueger had a huge game for the Wildcats, recording a game-high 13 tackles with three tackles for loss (-22 yards) and 1.5 sacks. Senior linebacker Nick Baldetti added 11 tackles and Troy Pribnow contributed 2.5 sacks in the win as the Wildcat defense forced four Bemidji State turnovers.

2007 GAME-BY-GAME REVIEW



GAME 8 - Wayne State 42, SW Minn. State 28 Oct. 20, 2007 * Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

Wayne State used a big second half to achieve numerous milestones in Saturday's 42-28 Northern Sun Conference football win over Southwest Minnesota State at Cunningham Field in Wayne. The win was the fourth straight for the Wildcats, now 5-3 overall and 5-1 in the NSIC. It's the first four-game win streak for the Wildcat football program since 1993 and the five conference wins marks the first time since 1984 that a WSC football team has won five conference games.

The Wildcats gained 395 of their season-high 567 yards in the second half to rally from a 21-7 halftime deficit in the win. The visiting Mustangs took the opening drive of the game and marched 65 yards on 12 plays to take an early 7-0 lead as sophomore running back Zach Wysong scored on a one-yard run to put SMSU in front. Later in the first quarter, SMSU took advantage of a Silas Fluellen fumble as Tyler Reed picked up the loose ball and rambled 27 yards for a score to give the Mustangs a 14-0 lead with 4:24 remaining in the first quarter. The Wildcats answered on the next drive with their first score of the game as Travis Rhone found the end zone on a two-yard run with :41 seconds left in the first quarter, cutting the Mustang lead to 14-7.

The lone score in the second quarter came just before halftime as Derek Townsend was on the receiving end of a 25-yard scoring pass by quarterback Josh Shudlick with just 12 seconds left in the second quarter, giving Southwest Minnesota State a 21-7 lead at the intermission.

But the Wildcats came out strong in the second half and used a punishing rushing attack to get back into the ball game. WSC needed just four plays and 75 yards, all on the ground, to score on the opening drive of the second half at Rhone hit pay dirt from 14 yards out, making the score 21-14 in favor of SMSU. After forcing SMSU to punt on their first series of the second half, WSC used a six play, 54 yard drive to knot the score midway through the third quarter as Eric Meyer scored on a one-yard run at the 8:54 mark, making the score 21-21. The Wildcats took their first lead of the game at the 4:22 mark of the third quarter when Meyer scored on a two-yard plunge to cap a six-play, 58 yard drive to give WSC a 28-21 lead. However, SMSU scored on the next drive, marching 77 yards on seven plays, to tie the score at 28-28. The scoring drive was capped by Zach Wysong's 22 yard run. But Wayne State wasted little time to regain the lead as Meyer sprinted 62 yards for his third score of the third quarter, giving the Wildcats a 35-28 lead entering the fourth quarter.

Wayne State added an insurance score in the fourth quarter as Silas Fluellen scored on a four-yard run with 4:16 remaining to give the Wildcats the 42-28 win.

WSC finished the game with 567 yards of total offense (366 rushing, 201 passing) with 395 coming in the second half. SMSU finished with 411 yards, but only 156 came in the second half when the Wildcats made their comeback. Travis Rhone led a balanced rushing attack for Wayne State with 155 yards on 27 carries and two scores. Freshman Robert Perry added 85 yards on just six attempts while sophomore Eric Meyer had a career-high 72 yards rushing on five attempts with three resulting in touchdowns. Fluellen completed 18 of 26 passes for 201 yards with no touchdowns or interceptions.

SMSU was led offensively by quarterback Josh Shudlick, who completed 27 of 47 passes for 314 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions.

Defensively, junior linebacker Luke Hoffman paced the Wildcats with 10 tackles followed by Nick Baldetti with nine and a fumble recovery. B.J. Campbell had two interceptions for WSC with Benny Collins also picking off a pass.

GAME 9 - Concordia-St. Paul 27, Wayne State 24 Oct. 27, 2007 * Griffin Stadium * St. Paul, Minn.

Wayne State scored 34 points in the fourth quarter, rallying from a 37-14 deficit, to post a dramatic 48-44 win at Concordia-St. Paul in Northern Sun Conference football Saturday afternoon at Griffin Stadium in St. Paul, Minnesota. The win was the fifth straight for Wayne State, moving the Wildcats to 6-3 overall and 6-1 in the NSIC while CSP slips to 3-6 overall and 2-5 in league play. The win also assures WSC of a winning season in football for the first time since 1995 when the 'Cats went 6-4 under Dennis Wagner.

The Wildcats got off to a quick start, forcing Concordia-St. Paul to punt on their first possession, then scoring on their first offensive series of the game to take a 7-0 lead. Travis Rhone scored on a 16-yard run to cap a nine-play, 76 yard drive with 4:29 to go in the first quarter. But the Golden Bears scored on four straight possessions, two off of WSC turnovers, to take control of the game and grab a 31-7 lead at halftime. Kama Johnson of Concordia-St. Paul hit paydirt on a one-yard run with 1:41 to go in the first quarter to make the score 7-7. Another Johnson TD run of four yards put the Golden Bears in front 14-7 at the 11:57 mark of the second quarter. Following a WSC interception, Antwon Williams scored on a one-yard run to cap a 39 yard, seven-play drive as the Golden Bears took a 21-7 lead with 7:48 left in the first half. Less than one minute later, Orion Facion picked up a Travis Rhone fumble and scored on a three-yard fumble recovery to give Concordia-St. Paul a 28-7 lead. The Golden Bears closed out the first half scoring with a 37-yard field goal by Stephen Bjerke to give the Golden Bears a 31-7 lead at halftime.

WSC took the second half kickoff and marched 90 yards on 10 plays, capped by a 33-yard touchdown pass from Silas Fluellen to Frederick Bruno, making the score 31-14 with 11:17 left in the third quarter. That would be the only scoring in the third quarter.

Following a Wayne State fumble, CSP opened the scoring in the fourth quarter on a 39-yard pass play from Cole Goodchild to Tyrone Ruffin, giving the Golden Bears a 37-14 lead with 13:59 left in the game. WSC responded with a score 65 seconds later as Bruno hauled in a 39-yard scoring strike from Fluellen to cap a four-play, 63 yard drive to make the score 37-21 with 12:54 remaining. The Golden Bears wasted little time to score again as Goodchild hit Ruffin on a 20-yard scoring play, giving CSP a 44-21 lead with 10:47 to go.

Wayne State then scored four touchdowns in the final 10 minutes to cap the miraculous win. The first score came on a 34-yard pass play from Fluellen to Logan Masters, making the score 44-28 with 9:54 left in the game. On the next series, CSP moved the ball to the Wildcat six yard line where the Golden Bears attempted a 22-yard field goal, but B.J. Campbell blocked the kick by Bjerke to give WSC the ball back. The 'Cats then drove 73 yards in eight plays and scored with 7:13 left in the quarter on a five-yard pass from Fluellen to Brian Chapman, cutting the Golden Bear lead to 44-34. WSC then forced CSP to punt on the next series, getting the ball at their own 44-yard line. Fluellen guided the Wildcats on a four play, 56 yard drive, capped by a 24-yard scoring pass to Masters, making the score 44-41 with 3:01 left in the game.

The Wildcats then recovered an onside kick and got the ball back at the WSC 44 yard line. WSC drove down to the CSP five yard line, only to have a Fluellen pass intercepted by Jordan Frain to stop the drive. However, the Wildcat defense held CSP on three plays and forced the Golden Bears to punt, resulting in just a 17-yard punt that gave WSC the ball at the CSP 25-yard line with 1:21 remaining. A Fluellen rush of 21 yards put the ball at the CSP four-yard line, then following an offside call on CSP, Travis Rhone scored on a two-yard run with 1:10 remaining to give WSC the lead at 48-44 following Nick Hope's PAT kick.

Concordia-St. Paul had one last chance to come back, starting at their own 32 yard line with 1:05 left. The Golden Bears moved the ball to the WSC 38-yard line, but the Wildcats sealed the win on a sack for 16 yards by Troy Pribnow as Wayne State posted the dramatic 48-44 comeback win over the Golden Bears.

"This was the strangest game I've ever been a part of," remarked WSC head coach Dan McLaughlin after the game. "To win this game with six turnovers is amazing. We got a little momentum early in the second half and then went to a no huddle offense and that put them on their heels and things started going our way. Our receivers made some great catches and Silas (Fluellen) made some great calls in the no huddle offense."

After being held to just 135 yards in the first half, Wayne State gained 491 yards in the second half to finish the game with 626 yards of total offense. Concordia-St. Paul finished the game with 458 yards with 276 coming in the first half. WSC sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen completed 26 of 45 passes for a career-high 389 yards and five touchdowns, another career-high. He was intercepted three times. Fluellen also rushed for 124 yards on 13 carries to finish the game with a combined 513 yards of offense in the win. The top receiver for Wayne State was sophomore Logan Masters with eight receptions for 112 yards and two touchdowns. Brian Chapman added seven catches for 94 yards and one score while Frederick Bruno had four receptions for 120 yards and two scores.

Concordia-St. Paul quarterback Cole Goodchild completed 28 of 44 passes for 322 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. Kama Johnson rushed for 121 yards on 26 carries and two touchdowns.

Defensively, junior linebacker Luke Hoffman recorded a career-high 17 tackles followed by senior linebacker Nick Baldetti with 12 stops.

Wayne State is now 9-1 in road NSIC games under third-year head coach Dan McLaughlin with the lone road loss coming two years ago at Concordia-St. Paul 46-20.

Game 10 - Wayne State 35, Mary 30

Nov. 3, 2007 * Cunningham Field * Wayne, Neb.

Wayne State College won its sixth straight game Saturday afternoon with a thrilling 35-30 Northern Sun Conference win over the University of Mary in the 19th annual Egg Bowl Game at Cunningham Field in Wayne. The Wildcats gained sole possession of second place in the NSIC by improving to 7-1 in league play and 7-3 overall while snapping Mary's six-game win streak dropping the Marauders to 6-4 overall and 6-2 in the NSIC.

The Wildcats dominated the first half of the contest, grabbing a 21-3 lead at halftime while holding Mary to just 78 yards of total offense in the first half. The Marauders opened the scoring midway through the first quarter when Rett Thibodeaux connected on a 27 yard field goal to cap a 14-play, 55-yard drive, giving the Marauders a 3-0 lead.

Wayne State scored on three straight possessions in the second quarter to take control of the game. Sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen capped a seven-play, 51 yard drive by scoring on a one-yard run on fourth and goal, crossing the goal line on a bootleg, to give WSC a 7-3 lead with 7:26 to go in the second quarter. After forcing a Mary punt, WSC marched 65 yards on 11 plays to grab a 14-3 lead following a nine-yard pass from Fluellen to Robert Perry with 2:25 to go in the second quarter. The Wildcats got the ball back moments later after recovering a Mary fumble at the Marauders 17-yard line and scored again with just 34 seconds remaining in the first half on a Travis Rhone one-yard run, putting the Wildcats in front 21-3 at halftime.

But Mary took advantage of a pair of Wayne State miscues on special teams to start the second half, allowing the Marauders back into the game. Mary's Mike Williams returned the second half kickoff 61 yards to give the Marauders the ball at the WSC 23 yard line. Three plays later, Bayland Rippenkroeger scored on a one-yard run to make the score 21-9 after a failed PAT kick by Rett Thibodeaux. Mary then recovered a fumble on the ensuing kickoff and drove 41 yards for another score as quarterback Blair Sandy hit Mike Williams on a 22-yard scoring play with 12:49 to go in the third quarter, cutting the Wildcat lead to 21-16.

Later in the third quarter, Wayne State gained some momentum back as Fluellen hit Logan Masters on a slant pass and Masters outran the Mary secondary 79 yards for a score to put the Wildcats ahead 28-16 with 4:10 left in the third quarter.

Mary put together a solid drive on the next possession and had the ball first and goal at the Wayne State three-yard line, but the Wildcat defense buckled down and stopped the scoring threat as Blair Sandy's pass to Erik Kruse fell incomplete on fourth and goal at the four to end the drive.

But the Marauders forced WSC to punt into the wind and got the ball back at the Wildcat 41-yard line. Mary marched 41 yards on eight plays, capped by a four-yard scoring pass from Blair Sandy to Erik Kruse, making the score 28-23 with 10:14 remaining in the game.

Each team then traded punts with Mary starting a drive at the WSC 36-yard line with 4:28 remaining, trailing 28-23. But WSC senior linebacker Nick Baldetti stepping in front of a Blair Sandy pass and raced 75 yards with the interception for a touchdown, giving Wayne State a 35-23 lead with 4:12 to go. But Mary wouldn't go away as the Marauders went 68 yards on eight plays to make the score 35-30 following a five-yard pass from Sandy to Jamie January with 1:35 remaining.

The Marauders then attempted an onside kick but the ball went out of bounds at the Wildcat 49-yard line and WSC ran out the final 1:35 to seal the win.

Mary finished the game with 316 yards of total offense to 306 for Wayne State. Silas Fluellen completed 12 of 24 passes for 197 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. Logan Masters was the top receiver for WSC with four receptions for 130 yards and one score. Travis Rhone was the top rusher for WSC with 64 yards on 27 carries.

Blair Sandy was 23 of 44 passing for 242 yards with three touchdowns to lead the University of Mary offensively. Erik Kruse was the top receiver with seven receptions for 67 yards and one score.

Wayne State senior linebacker Nick Baldetti was selected Egg Bowl MVP for the Wildcats with a team-high 10 tackles and his 75-yard interception return for a touchdown. The Wildcats' defense recorded seven sacks in the game with Troy Pribnow credited with 2.5 sacks followed by Chris Barry and Tyler Krueger with 1.5 sacks apiece.

Junior wide receiver Mike Williams was selected Egg Bowl MVP for Mary after making six catches for 66 yards and one touchdown to go with 60 yards in returns.

GAME 11 - Winona State 59, Wayne State 34

Nov. 10, 2007 * Metrodome * Minneapolis, Minn.

Winona State captured its 18th Northern Sun Conference football crown Saturday afternoon with a 59-34 win over Wayne State at the NSIC Merchants Bank Metrodome Classic in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The 10-1 Warriors finished league play with a perfect 9-0 mark while Wayne State takes second in the NSIC at 7-2 and 7-4 overall. The Wildcats will represent the NSIC in the Mineral Water Bowl in Excelsior Springs, Missouri on December 1, marking just the second time in school history that a Wildcat football team will play in a post-season game. The other appearance was 1970 when WSC lost to Franklin, Indiana 40-12 in the Mineral Water Bowl.

Wayne State started slowly as Winona State scored on their first two possessions of the game to grab an early 14-0 lead. Andrew Verbancoeur hauled in an eight-yard scoring pass from quarterback Drew Aber 2:21 into the game for the first score followed by an Aber to Scott Peters four-yard strike with 6:17 remaining in the first quarter. But WSC struck back as sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen connected with Frederick Bruno on a 72-yard touchdown pass just 20 seconds later, making the score 14-7. After forcing a Winona State punt, WSC drove 80 yards on nine plays as junior running back Travis Rhone scored on a 30-yard run on a fourth and one play, cutting the Warrior lead to 14-13 with 14:51 left in the second quarter as the extra point kick by WSC was blocked.

The Warriors countered Wayne State's momentum with a 76-yard drive as Aber found Verbancoeur on a five-yard scoring play, giving Winona State a 21-13 lead with 11:46 to go in the second quarter. Winona later recovered a Fluellen fumble and took over at their own 32 yard line where on the first play of the drive, Aber delivered a 68-yard pass to Peters to put the Warriors in front 28-13 with 9:55 left until halftime. After WSC was forced to punt on their next drive, the Warriors used another big play, an 82-yard scoring run by Alex Wiese, to grab a 35-13 lead. Winona State closed out the first half scoring with a 42-yard field goal by Ryan Abbott on the final play of the half to give the Warriors a 38-13 lead.

WSC opened the second half by marching 68 yards on nine plays as Fluellen connected with sophomore wide receiver Logan Masters on a nine-yard scoring play, making the score 38-20. Later in the third quarter, Winona State quarterback Drew Aber capped a 10-play, 79 yard drive with a 19 yard scoring run, giving the Warriors a 45-20 lead at the 5:03 mark of the third quarter. Wayne State responded on the next drive as Rhone scored on a five-yard run to culminate a seven-play, 68 yard drive to make the score 45-27 with 3:19 to go in the third quarter. But again Winona State would not give Wayne State a chance to get back in the game as Aber produced a 27-yard scoring play to Scott Sherman with six seconds left in the third quarter giving the Warriors a 52-27 advantage.

Each team scored once in the fourth quarter as Winona's Alex Wiese scored on a one-yard run and Wayne State's Travis Rhone found the end zone on a nine-yard run with 4:42 remaining to cap the scoring slugfest as Winona State won 59-34.

The two teams combined for 1,257 yards in the game with Winona State gaining 652 and Wayne State finishing with 605 yards of offense. WSC sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen accounted for 502 yards of total offense to lead the Wildcats, completing 27 of 41 passes for a career-high 406 yards and two touchdowns while rushing for 96 yards on 16 attempts. Travis Rhone was the top receiver with seven catches for 61 yards while freshman Frederick Bruno added six catches for 191 yards and one score. Sophomore wide receiver Logan Masters contributed five catches for 81 yards and one score, extending his streak to 22 consecutive games with at least two receptions in a game.

Winona State was led by senior running back Alex Wiese, who rushed for 313 yards on 30 carries with two touchdowns. Warrior quarterback Drew Aber completed 18 of 26 passes for 255 yards and five touchdowns with his favorite target being Scott Peters with seven catches for 139 yards and two scores.

Senior linebacker Nick Baldetti and freshman defensive back Javal Jones led WSC on defense with eight tackles each.

GAME 12 - Missouri Western 20, Wayne State 13 42nd annual Mineral Water Bowl

December 1, 2007 * Tiger Stadium * Excelsior Springs, Missouri

Missouri Western edged Wayne State 20-13 in the 42nd Mineral Water Bowl played on a cold, rainy and windy Saturday afternoon in Excelsior Springs, Missouri. MWSU finishes the season at 9-3 while Wayne State ends the season at 7-5, the first winning season for Wildcat football since 1995 and just the second post-season appearance in 91 years of WSC football.

The only score of the first half was by Missouri Western on the first play of the second quarter as Griffon freshman quarterback Drew Newhart tossed an 11-yard scoring strike to Andrew Mead, capping a 10-play, 94 yard drive, to give Missouri Western a 7-0 lead.

Wayne State gained some momentum midway through the second quarter when junior B.J. Campbell intercepted a MWSU pass at the WSC 30 and raced 32 yards to give the Wildcats the ball at the Griffon 38-yard line. However, WSC could not capitalize on the strong field position as the Wildcats threw an interception in the end zone on 4th and 14 at the MWSU 42 for a touchback to end the scoring threat. After forcing Missouri Western to punt on a three and out on the next series, WSC moved the ball from their own 40-yard line to the Griffon 10-yard line before a Wildcat turnover ended the deepest drive of the first half for Wayne State with 3:43 to go in the first half. On a 3rd and 8 from the MWSU 19 yard line, Wildcat quarterback Silas Fluellen was hurdling a Griffon defender looking for extra yardage when he was hit hard and fumbled the ball as Missouri Western's Ryan Long recovered the ball at the Griffon 11-yard line to end the scoring opportunity.

Wayne State tied the score on their second series of the third quarter as the Wildcats drove 91 yards on 11 plays to even the score at 7-7. Sophomore running back Eric Meyer capped the scoring drive with a 29-yard run with 5:39 to go in the third quarter to knot the score at 7-7. But Missouri Western countered with a score on the next drive as freshman running back La'Darrian Page broke several WSC tackles to highlight an impressive 55-yard scoring run to give the Griffons a 14-7 lead with 4:37 remaining in the third quarter. The Griffons increased their lead to 17-7 as MWSU placekicker Dustin Strickler booted a wind-aided 48-yard field goal with 1:40 left in the third quarter, matching the longest field goal in Mineral Water Bowl history.

Following a second straight three and out by Wayne State, the Griffons used a 30-yard field goal from Strickler to put the Griffons in front 20-7 with 13:32 remaining in the game. Wayne State answered on the following drive as the Wildcats drove 68 yards on 10 plays to cut the Missouri Western lead to 20-13 with 10:50 to go in the game. Fluellen threw a six-yard scoring pass to sophomore Aaron Nielsen, who was in the game as an extra blocking back, for his first career reception and a touchdown. The PAT kick by Nick Hope was no good to keep the score 20-13.

The Wayne State defense forced a Griffon turnover on the series as Nick Baldetti recovered the Missouri Western fumble at the Griffon 39-yard line with 9:28 left in the game. The Wildcats moved the ball to the MWSU nine-yard line, but a Silas Fluellen pass intended for Robert Perry near the goal line was intercepted by Missouri Western's Kendall Davis to thwart the possible game-tying score by the Wildcats. Missouri Western then drove the ball to the Wildcat 19-yard line before fumbling the ball back to Wayne State as sophomore linebacker Ryan Reeves recovered the ball to give the 'Cats the ball with 4:22 to go in the game.

WSC moved the ball to the Missouri Western 17 yard line with 1:12 to go, but on a 4th and 4 Fluellen's pass to Frederick Bruno fell incomplete as the Griffons held the Wildcats to preserve the win.

Missouri Western finished the game with a slight edge in total offense over Wayne State 395-388. WSC had 181 yards rushing and 207 yards passing. The top rusher for WSC was sophomore quarterback Silas Fluellen with 75 yards on 15 carries followed by Travis Rhone with 67 yards on 20 attempts. Fluellen completed 22 of 43 for 207 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions. His favorite target was Logan Masters with 11 receptions for 119 yards. The sophomore from Storm Lake, Iowa has now made at least two catches in all 23 games played in his Wildcat career.

For Missouri Western, freshman La'Darrian Page rushed for 147 yards on just 15 carries and scored one touchdown to be named Mineral Water Bowl Game MVP. Griffon quarterback Drew Newhart completed 14 of 29 passing with one interception and one touchdown for 146 yards.

Wayne State's top tacklers were senior linebacker Nick Baldetti and sophomore linebacker Ryan Reeves with eight tackles apiece. Reeves also had a fumble recovery with B.J. Campbell recording an interception.

THE NORTHERN SUN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE



Founded in 1932, the Northern Intercollegiate Conference (NIC) has enjoyed a varied existence in the upper Midwest region it calls home. In the spring of 1992 the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) was formed out of the merger of the NIC, the men's conference, and the women's Northern Sun Conference (NSC). The NSC had existed since 1979. The NSIC is currently made up of institutions from Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota. In the 2008-09 academic year, the NSIC expanded to a 14-team league with the addition of Augustana College, University of Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota State University, Mankato and St. Cloud State University.

Since 1932, various institutions have competed in the NSIC. Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University Moorhead and Winona State University are charter members and have remained in the conference for the 76 years of its existence. Minnesota State University, Mankato and St. Cloud State were also charter members, but left the league in 1981 (MSU left the league in 1969 and returned in 1977). The University of Minnesota Duluth, which departed the league in 2005-06 through 2007-08 seasons, was also an original member. Other current members joined in later years: Southwest Minnesota State University in 1969, Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (Nebraska) in 1998, Concordia University, St. Paul and the University of Minnesota, Crookston in 1999, the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006 and Augustana College in 2008. The University of Minnesota, Morris became a league member in 1966, however, the Cougars opted for the NCAA Division III ranks in 2003. Michigan Tech was part of the NIC from 1969 to 1977 as well.

Before the NSIC became eligible for National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) championship competition in 1995, its member institutions had an extremely rich tradition in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The NIC's and NSC's tenure in the NAIA included several national championship teams and individuals as well as many national qualifiers.

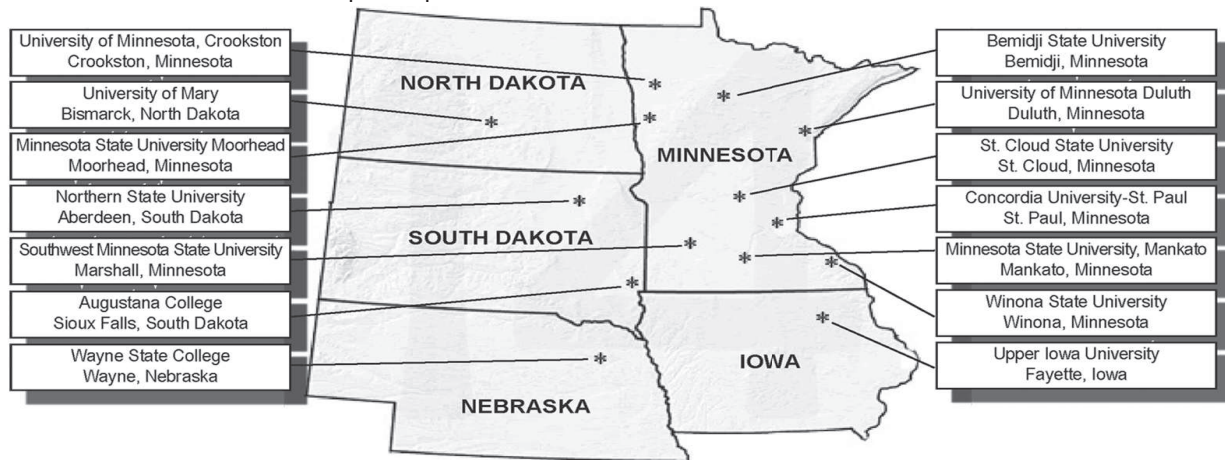
The NSIC has gained national recognition in recent years as three teams have won National Championships. Winona State

men's basketball made three straight trips to the NCAA Division II National Championship game, winning the 2006 and 2008 games and losing the 2007 game on a last second shot. During that period, the Warriors won an NCAA record 57 consecutive games. Concordia University, St. Paul garnered the first women's title in 2007 as its volleyball team won the National Championship.

Following the 2004-05 season, Winona State became the first team other than Minnesota Duluth to capture the NSIC All-Sports Competition trophy. The Warriors have taken home the trophy now the last two seasons. Winona State put the NSIC on the national map in 2006 as they hosted and won the NCAA North Central Regional Tournament and went on to capture the Division II National Championship.

Since 2000, the NSIC has participated in one of two officially-sanctioned NCAA Division II football bowl games in the country. Dating back to 1948, the Mineral Water Bowl is hosted by the Quarterback Club of Excelsior Springs, Missouri. The game matches the highest-finishing team from the NSIC not selected for the NCAA Division II playoffs against the highest-finishing team from the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) not participating in the NCAA Division II playoffs. The first NSIC/MIAA meeting in 2000 marked the Mineral Water Bowl's inaugural year of the Division II era. Wayne State represented the NSIC in the 2007 Mineral Water Bowl game and dropped a hard-fought 20-13 contest to Missouri Western.

Over the years the NSIC, comprised of schools of modest size, has provided extremely competitive intercollegiate athletic programs for its members. Although the programs are not designed to be equal to Division I athletics, many former NSIC athletes have distinguished themselves in national and international competition. Each member school emphasizes the educational, entertainment and unifying value of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. As some affiliated with the conference have coined, the NSIC quite possibly is, "the most competitive conference in NCAA Division II."

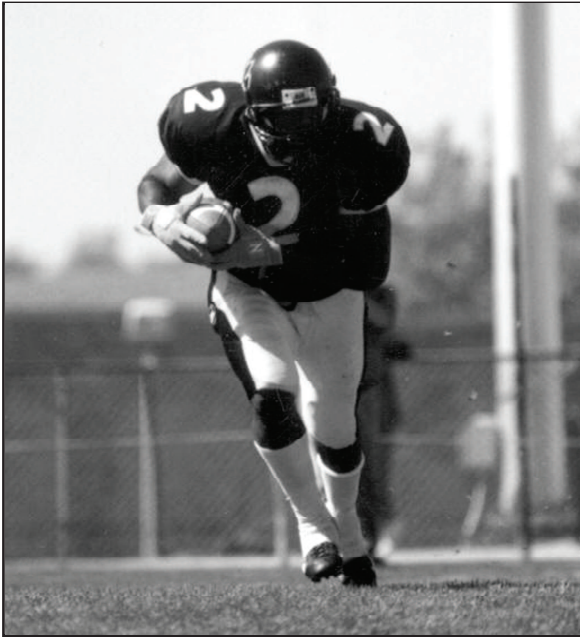

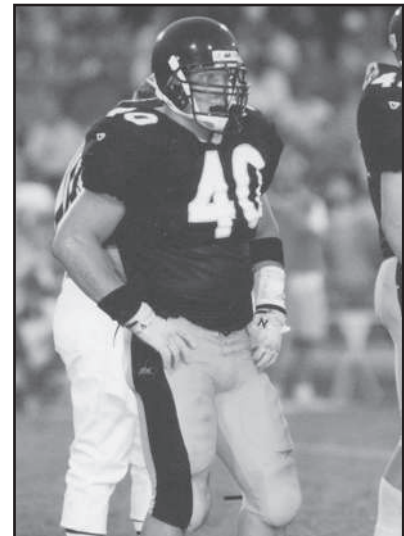
