MEDIA INFORMATION



MEDIA GUIDELINES

CREDENTIALS

Requests for press, radio, photography and television credentials should be made two days prior to the match to insure seating along press row. Requests should be directed to Sports Information Director Mike Grosz. Only members of the working media will be issued credentials.

Credentials may be picked up at the will-call window, located at the west entrance to Rice Auditorium. Credentials must be visible at all times.

RADIO

A visitor's radio table, equipped with a phone line, is available on the stage behind the visiting team's bench. Radio stations should contact the Sports Information Office a week before the match to receive broadcast information.

PHOTOGRAPHS

Photographers must follow all NCAA and WSC regulations concerning locations where it is permissible to take photos. Photographers are not allowed behind the team benches, but are allowed to take photos from the stage.

PARKING

Limited space is available in a reserved parking lot located outside Rice Auditorium. Contact the Sports Information Office for parking availability.

WEEKLY INTERVIEWS

Coach Kneifl and the WSC players will be available for interviews during the week. Interviews are not allowed during practices and before matches. Interview requests should be made through the Sports Information Office.

POST-MATCH INTERVIEWS

Following a 10-minute "cooling off" period, Coach Kneifl and the WSC players will be available for post-match interviews near press row. Interview requests with WSC players will be taken near the end of the match.

STATISTICS

Before the match, a package consisting of a game program, pre-game notes and statistics will be available. A list of match leaders will also be provided between each game.

Final statistics will be distributed to press row approximately 15-20 minutes after the conclusion of the match.

The Sports Information Office will fax results to any desired media outlet. Fax lists should be submitted a day prior to the match.

Innovative Programs

Wayne State's four academic schools—Arts and Humanities, Business and Technology, Education and Counseling, and Natural and Social Sciences—offer a comprehensive selection of courses. You'll find 80 majors and minors ranging from pre-professional studies to criminal justice to a nationally accredited undergraduate sports management program, and many others in 14 academic departments across campus.

The Rural Health Opportunities Program (RHOP) at Wayne State College provides pre-professional training in medicine, pharmacy and dentistry in cooperation with the University of Nebraska Medical Center. Students who successfully complete the program at WSC are automatically accepted into medical, pharmacy, or dental school at UNMC.

Thinking of teaching? Upper-level education majors at Wayne State have the opportunity to participate in the Northeast Nebraska Teacher Academy (NENTA), the first of its kind in the nation, where WSC students receive classroom experience with participating K-12 schools in the region.

Through WSC WebCat On-line, students can register for class, check on grades and student accounts, from the convenience of their home or residence hall room.

Excellent Career Preparation

Whether you plan to be an accountant or a wildlife biologist, you'll receive the preparation you need at Wayne State College. In addition to classes taught by experts in their fields, Wayne State College provides internship and cooperative programs for students in a number of majors. Many regional businesses actively recruit Wayne State students for internships, with many of these internships resulting in full-time employment after graduation.

The WSC Career Services office assists students with career exploration, job preparation skills, interviews, as well as arranging internships and cooperative experiences.



Personal Attention

Students at Wayne State College don't get lost in the crowd. With an average class size of 21 and a student/faculty ratio of 19:1, WSC students get to know their professors and classmates. Eighty percent of Wayne State professors have the highest degree in their field—and most teach first-year as well as upper-level classes. You will find dedicated professors and instructors at Wayne State College: teaching is their life's work, and their enthusiasm is contagious.

Wayne State College offers a variety of support services and programs to students. The heart of the WSC campus is the Student Center, where academic and personal support services are located. Active Campus Life

With more than 85 clubs and organizations on campus, Wayne State College students have many opportunities to be involved in campus and community life.

Wayne State College has an active Greek life, with Greek Olympics being held at Homecoming each fall, as well as other social and service activities. The Student Activities Board (SAB) plans a variety of special programs each year, bringing musical groups such as Vertical Horizon, Five for Fighting, Goo Goo Dolls, Sawyer Brown, Blackhawk, Jason Aldean, Firehouse and others to campus. Comedian Adam Sandler and other national performers have performed on campus.

The Multicultural Center, one of the newest campus programs, provides outreach and support to Wayne State College students and the region through special events during the year.

Wayne State College competes in NCAA Division II, and is a member of the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference. Competitive sports include football, volleyball, men's and women's basketball and track, cross country, men's baseball, women's softball, men's and women's golf, and women's soccer.

Scenic Surroundings

You'll feel right at home on Wayne State's beautiful, historic campus located in the northeast Nebraska community of Wayne. The campus combines stately, historic buildings with the newly renovated Student Center, Ramsey Theatre, Studio Arts Build-

ing and Connell Hall. A new state-of-the-art indoor track was completed in the summer of 2001 in the WSC Recreation Center and the outdoor track was renovated with a new surface in the summer and fall of 2003.

Wayne State College's seven residence halls provide students with a comfortable, affordable and convenient place to live with easy access to the entire campus community. Each hall has lounges and recreation areas, laundry facilities, mail service, academic tutors and study areas. Six of the seven halls are wired for access to the campus computer network from your personal computer.



WAYNE STATE ADMINISTRATION



Dr. Richard Collings *President*

Dr. Richard Collings is in his fifth year as the 11th president of Wayne State College. Prior to assuming the presidency of Wayne State, Collings was vice chancellor for academic affairs and professor of political science and public affairs at Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, North Carolina, a position he held from 1996-2004. At Western Carolina, he led many academic and administration initiatives, including creating a residential honors college, developing technology partnerships with other institutions throughout the nation and implementing a strategic planning process.

From 1991-96, Collings was provost and vice president for academic affairs at Kutztown University of Pennsylvania, where he had served as dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences from 1989-91. Previously, he was assistant provost and chairperson of the department of political science at Southeast Missouri State in Cape Girardeau, Mo.

A native of Louisville, Ky., Collings earned a Ph.D. in political science in 1977 and a master's degree in Latin American studies in 1972, both from Tulane University. He received a bachelor's degree in international studies from the University of Louisville in 1968.

President Collings and his wife, Marilyn, have three grown children: Michael, Kristen and Kelly. They also have four grandchildren, Ethan, Kai, Noah and Olivia.



Eric Schoh *Director of Athletics*

Entering his fifth year as athletic director, Eric Schoh has injected enthusiasm and success into the Wildcat athletic department.

Wayne State College placed second in the 2007-08 Northern Sun Conference All-Sports Standings by winning two conference championships (baseball and men's outdoor track and field). 11 of the school's 15 sports finished in the top three in their respective sport in the NSIC while three teams (volleyball, women's basketball and baseball) also qualified for NCAA post-season competition.

"Everyone associated with Wildcat athletics should be proud of our accomplishments this past year," said Schoh. "The student-athletes, coaches, campus community and people of Wayne all had a hand in our success. It is a credit to the quality student-athletes we have at Wayne State when you are able to combine academic accomplishments with athletic success."

Prior to coming to Wayne State, Schoh was the associate athletic director for development at California State University in Bakersfield, Calif. from 2002-2004. From 1998-2002, Schoh was associate director of athletics at the University of South Dakota.

He was the regional director of D.D. Marketing Inc. in Pueblo, Colorado from 1997-98 and was the assistant director of athletics at Montana State University in Billings, Montana from 1995-97.

Schoh earned his master's degree in education from Iowa State University. He earned his bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communications from Iowa State University as well.

Schoh is a native of LaCrescent, Minnesota. He and his wife, Stephanie, have three children: Paige, Eric and Tyler.



Mike Barry *Assistant Director of Athletics*

Mike Barry is in his ninth year as associate director of athletics. Barry is also in his 11th year as the director of sports and recreational facilities. His duties include scheduling athletic contests and practices, home game management and serving as the athletic and recreational facilities' coordinator.

Barry was the Wayne State women's basketball head coach for seven seasons. He compiled a 97-92 record, which is second all-time on the school's career victory list. His best team was the 1993-94 squad which posted a 22-5 record.

Barry came to Wayne State following two years as an assistant women's basketball coach at Pratt Community College in Kansas. He also coached at Chadron State, Eastern New Mexico University, and Fullerton and Stuart high schools in Nebraska.

Barry, a native of Grant, Neb., was a four-sport athlete at Chadron State. He was a three-time NAIA national qualifier in the triple jump, and also lettered in basketball, football, and cross country.

Barry earned his Bachelor's Degree in Physical Education from Chadron State in 1983 and earned his Master's Degree in Secondary Education in 1988. He and his wife, Jeannette, have two sons, Jordan, 16, and Jalen, 13. Barry also has a son Rick, who lives in Crawford, Nebraska.



Shawn Pearcy *Faculty Athletic Representative*

Dr. Shawn Pearcy is in his fifth year as Faculty Athletic Representative at Wayne State College. Pearcy, an associate professor in the Life Sciences Department, is in his 11th year teaching at the school.

An Indiana native, Pearcy attended Purdue University and Indiana University, earning his bachelors degree from Indiana University in 1989. While an undergraduate, he participated in crew, ultimate and lacrosse. Pearcy attended graduate school at Washington State University, completing his doctorate in Zoophysiology in 1996. He enjoys teaching general biology, human physiology and vertebrae embryology at WSC. Pearcy is also a nationally-certified EMT and firefighter and serves on the Wayne Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Memorial Stadium / Bob Cunningham Field

Memorial Stadium has been "Home of the Wildcats" since 1931 when the college purchased 11 acres of land for athletic fields. The grandstand was constructed in 1933. The stadium was officially designated Memorial Stadium following World War II in honor of the Wayne State students who served in the war. Bob Cunningham Field was named in 1993 for the WSC three-sport Hall of Fame standout (1936-39).

The press box was built at the time of the grandstand construction, with a second level being added in 1969.

The main stadium has seating for 2,500 fans while the bleachers on the east side of the field can seat an additional 750 fans. Cunningham Field has a natural grass surface.



Recreation Center

The Wayne State College Recreation Center opened in 1987 and is the college's main facility for student recreation and selected athletic activities.

The main area in the Recreation Center provides a six-lane running track that was resurfaced last year with one of the best surfaces used today. Three full-size courts for basketball, volleyball, tennis, and badminton are also housed in the rec center. Racquetball, weight training, aerobics, gymnastics, wrestling, and sauna facilities are all available to WSC students, faculty and staff as well as residents of the Wayne community.

The Recreation Center also houses locker rooms for Wildcat athletic teams, and offices for the WSC athletic department.



Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex

The baseball and softball complex at WSC opened in the spring of 1996. Located north of Memorial Stadium, the complex provides a picturesque setting for baseball and softball games. The baseball field received a face lift in the summer of 2004 with the additions of locker rooms, rest rooms, a concession stand and a press box. A new wood fence was installed on the baseball field prior to the start of the 2005 season.

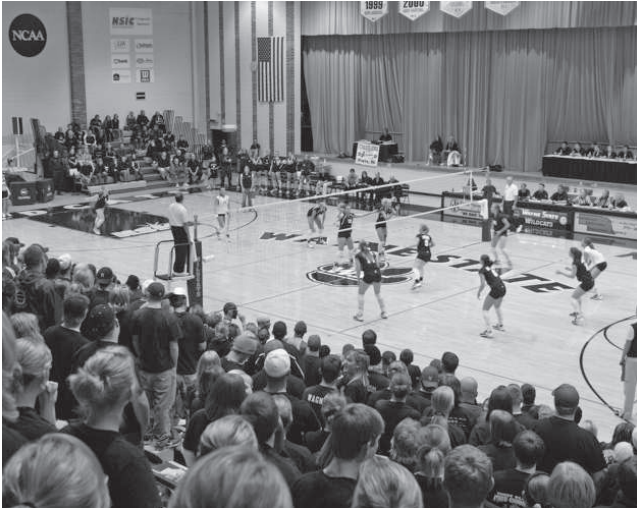
In the spring of 2006, the facility was named the Pete Chapman Baseball/Softball Complex in honor of the late athletic director/football coach and his contributions to the Wildcat athletic department. In the fall of 2006, a locker room/press box was built at the softball field. A new scoreboard was installed at the baseball field for the 2008 season.



WAYNE STATE FACILITIES



Rice Auditorium



Rice Auditorium serves as the home for the Wildcat volleyball squad as well as men's and women's basketball teams. Recent upgrades to the arena include: new balcony seats and a new stage curtain (summer 2007); a new playing surface in 2004; new scoreboards on the north and south walls (summer of 1998) and new bleachers in the lower level (summer of 1996). Its facilities include refurbished locker rooms, classrooms, a training room, and a state-of-the-art training facility.

The gymnasium area seats approximately 2,500 for basketball games and volleyball matches. Named for John D. Rice, Wayne State College president from 1951-56, Rice Auditorium was the site of the 1999 NCAA Division II North Central Regional Men's Basketball Championships and the 2006 NSIC Red Baron Women's Basketball Classic.

New balcony seating were installed during the summer of 2007, replacing the old wooden seats that had been in place since the 1960's. A new black stage curtain has also been installed at Rice Auditorium, replacing an aging gold curtain.



Strength Training Complex

The Strength Training Complex at Wayne State is one of the finest equipped facilities in the Nebraska State College system. The 2,400-square foot facility is equipped with a variety of both free weight and variable resistance apparatus. Six Olympic benches, six incline benches, eight squat racks, three hip sleds, two hi-low lateral pull machines and a Pec Dec, along with a complete assortment of dumbbells help facilitate as many as 70 athletes without delay. An extensive remodeling project was responsible for improved lighting, a sound system, and flooring in the strength room. Recently, more renovations were made, including painting the walls, additional mirrors and raising the ceiling in one area for overhead lifting.



Carlson Natatorium

Carlson Natatorium adjoins the Recreation Center and Rice Auditorium. The 25-yard long pool is used for a variety of functions, including lap swimming, aquasize classes, senior wellness aquasize classes, HHPS classes, intramural activities and athletic training rehabilitation exercises. The natatorium is open in the summer for use by the athletic camps and Rec Center members.



ATHLETIC TRAINING SERVICES



Muffin Morris *Head Athletic Trainer*



Muffin Morris is in her first year at Wayne State College, serving as the head athletic trainer. Morris comes to Wayne State College after serving four years at the University of South Dakota. She served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer and worked with football, softball, swimming/diving, track/cross country and volleyball

programs at USD.

The Chariton, Iowa native earned her bachelor's degree from Buena Vista University in athletic training in 2004. Morris then obtained her master's degree from the University of South Dakota in 2006 in health, physical education and recreation and recently earned her doctorate degree in adult/higher education from the University of South Dakota on July 31, 2008.

Morris is serving as the head trainer for the Wildcat football team this fall and resides in Wayne.

Athletic Training Room

The Athletic Training Room is the site of taping, treatment and injury evaluations. It has a variety of up to date, quality equipment. A partial inventory of modalities available for athletes include: three whirlpools, RichMar Theratouch 7.7 electrical stimulation machine, RichMar HV-II combination ultrasound/electrical stimulation machine, RichMar portable ultrasound machine, Game-ready intermittent compression machine, Therabath Parafin machine, and Hydrocollator heat pack units. The athletic training room also has three computers.

Dr. Steven Stokesbary *Team Orthopedist*



Dr. Steven Stokesbary enters his seventh season as Wayne State's team orthopedist.

Dr. Stokesbary is a partner in The Center for Neurosciences, Orthopaedics, and Spine Sports Medicine, P.C. (CNOS) in Dakota Dunes, South Dakota. He graduated from the University of Iowa and earned his medical degree also from the University of Iowa College of Medicine, after which he completed his

residency at the University of Missouri Health Services.

Dr. Stokesbary has been practicing for CNOS Sports Medicine for over seven years, which provides athletic training services for over 40 area high schools, colleges and professional organizations.

PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center

The PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center, which opened December 1, 2005, is a 4,000 square foot state-of-the-art facility. The center is located next to the Wayne State College Recreation Center and serves as the hub for therapy and athletic training services.

In August 2007, Providence Physical Therapy and Wayne State College collaborated to provide therapy services at the PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center. This partnership provides the finest in sports rehabilitation, therapy services and athletic training services to Wayne State student-athletes, the campus community and the general public.

Providence Physical Therapy offers physical, occupational and speech therapy services and is staffed by six physical therapists, two physical therapy assistants, two occupational therapists and one speech therapist. Providence Physical Therapy staff also provides aquatic therapy at the Carlson Natatorium.

Dedicated to excellence and quality care, the PMC Wildcat Sports Medicine Center athletic training staff and Providence Physical Therapy staff is committed to the health and wellness of WSC students, faculty and the Wayne community.





WILDCAT COACHING STAFF



Scott Kneifl *Head Coach*

In three seasons as head volleyball coach at Wayne State College, Scott Kneifl has elevated the Wildcat program to new heights. He has directed the Wildcats to an impressive 79-30 record, including a 38-12 mark in the Northern Sun Conference. WSC has qualified for the NCAA Div. II North Central Regional Tournament the last three seasons and added the school's first-ever NSIC Tournament title in 2007 to its list of milestones accomplished in recent years.

Kneifl coached Wayne State to a 24-12 record in 2007 and a third place finish in the Northern Sun Conference with a 13-5 league mark. The Wildcats peaked at the end of the season and captured the school's first-ever Northern Sun Conference Volleyball Tournament title as the Wildcats defeated MSU Moorhead 3-1 in the title match. WSC then advanced to its third straight NCAA Division II North Central Regional Tournament where the Wildcats suffered a hard fought 3-1 loss to eventual national champion Concordia-St. Paul in the first round.

The Wildcats recorded a stellar 30-8 mark in 2006, advancing to the NCAA Division II North Central Regional Tournament for the second straight season and reaching the semi-finals for the first time in school history. Kneifl also coached the school's first-ever All-American as junior middle hitter Emily Schroeder received Second Team All-American honors from AVCA and Daktronics while junior libero Laura Dolezal was named NSIC Libero of the Year for the second straight season. WSC also made a mark on the national scene, finishing the season ranked 20th in NCAA Division II while ranking 8th in home attendance, averaging over 520 fans per home match. The 2006 WSC volleyball squad also earned the Game Plan/AVCA Team Academic Award, maintaining an impressive 3.452 grade point average during the 2006-07 academic year.

In his first season as head coach in 2005, Kneifl directed the Wildcats to a 25-10 overall record and the team's first-ever berth in the NCAA Division II North Central Regional Volleyball Tournament. WSC finished tied for second in the Northern Sun Conference with a 10-4 league mark and for his efforts, Kneifl was awarded the NSIC Co-Coach of the Year Award.

Kneifl has coached at both the high school and college level and brings 12 years of experience to the Wildcat program. After three years at Allen High School, Kneifl chose to make the jump to the collegiate level and became the assistant women's volleyball coach at Doane College in Crete, Nebraska. While at Doane, the Tigers made it to the NAIA national tournament.

In 1998, Coach Kneifl was named head girl's volleyball coach at Millard South High School. In just his second year at the helm, Kneifl took MSHS to the district finals where they finished runner-up.

A native of Newcastle, Nebraska, Kneifl has also worked with many club volleyball programs including: Logan Valley, Tri-State, and Nebraska Juniors. In 1997, his Tri-State team won the regional tournament and earned a berth to the national club volleyball tournament.

Scott earned his bachelors degree from Wayne State in 1995 and achieved his masters degree in 2004 in sport management, also from Wayne State College. He and his wife Jennifer have three sons, Jacob, (5) Brooks, (3), and newborn son Jaxson (August 6, 2008) and they reside in Wayne.

The Wildcats were never challenged by the visiting Wolves as WSC hit over .300 in each game and finished the match with a .315 hitting percentage and just 10 hitting errors.

Besides Schroeder's 16 kills, junior Brittany Van Beek added 11 kills followed by Jennifer Hefner with nine for the Wildcats. Jenna Jansen handed out 42 set assists and libero Laura Dolezal recorded 12 digs in the win for Wayne State.

Wayne State, now 22-11 on the season, now faces second seed and 9th ranked Southwest Minnesota State in the semi-finals of the NSIC Volleyball Tournament in St. Paul, Minnesota on Friday (November 9).

Wayne State advanced to the championship match of the 2007 NSIC Volleyball Tournament with a 3-1 win over 9th-ranked Southwest Minnesota State Friday evening (November 9) in St. Paul, Minnesota. Scores of the tightly contested match were 30-26, 27-30, 30-28 and 30-27.

The Wildcats outhit SMSU .234-.202 as WSC had three players record 10 or more kills in the win. Junior outside hitter Brittany Van Beek continued her outstanding play as of late with 23 kills to lead the Wildcats while hitting .400 in the match with just three hitting errors. Senior All-American Emily Schroeder notched her third triple-double of the season with 16 kills, 17 digs and 11 blocks. Freshman Lea Hartigan added 13 kills, five blocks and three service aces for the Wildcats in the win.

Senior libero Laura Dolezal recorded 26 digs to lead the Wildcats on defense while freshman setter Jenna Jansen was credited with 63 set assists.

Wayne State will now face MSU Moorhead in the NSIC Tournament Championship match after the Dragons upset top-seed Concordia-St. Paul in the other semi-final match.

The Wayne State College volleyball team captured their first-ever Northern Sun Conference Volleyball Tournament title with a 3-1 win over MSU Moorhead in St. Paul, Minnesota. After falling in the first game to the Dragons 30-22, WSC stormed back to win the next three games 30-22, 30-19 and 30-22 to earn the league's automatic berth to the NCAA Division II North Central Regional Tournament.

The Wildcats had three players record double figures in kills as WSC hit .193 in the match. Junior outside hitter Brittany Van Beek led the attack with 18 kills. Senior Emily Schroeder recorded her second straight triple-double and fourth of the season with 16 kills, 15 digs and 13 blocks. Freshman middle hitter Jennifer Hefner added 15 kills in the win without a hitting error in 29 attacks to hit .517 for the match.

Libero Laura Dolezal led the 'Cats on defense with 30 digs followed by Jenna Jansen with 18 to go with 58 set assists.

Wayne State College rallied from a 2-1 deficit and downed #7 Southwest Minnesota State in five games on the second annual Black Out Night at Rice Auditorium before a crowd of 854 fans on October 24, 2007. Scores of the match were 30-25, 28-30, 15-30, 30-25 and 15-11. The 854 fans marked the third-most watched volleyball match in school history. The first Black Out Night on October 18, 2006 drew a new single game attendance record of 1,382 fans when WSC defeated Nebraska-Kearney 3-0 to snap a 19-match losing streak to the Lopers.

2008 SEASON OUTLOOK



Scott Kneifl begins his fourth season as the head volleyball coach at Wayne State College. He has compiled an impressive 78-30 overall record, leading the team to three straight NCAA National Tournament appearances and the school's first-ever NSIC Tournament title last season when the Wildcats finished 24-12 overall and 13-5 in the NSIC (third place). However, the Wildcats lose two-time All-American Emily Schroeder and three-time NSIC Libero of the Year Laura Dolezal to graduation, so Coach Kneifl will rely on a talented recruiting class along with five returning starters to match or better last year's accomplishments.

"We are very excited to get the season underway," commented Kneifl. "Although we have some big holes to fill with the loss of last year's senior class, we feel like we have players ready to step into roles and do anything they can to help the team reach our goals."

Leading the Wildcats at the net will be senior outside hitter Brittany Van Beek (Hull Western Christian HS), who averaged 3.29 kills per game last season and was named to the NSIC All-Tournament Team. "Brittany had a great second half of last season and will continue to be one of our go-to players this season," said Kneifl. "She is a difference maker in the front row."

Other seniors on this year's team are defensive specialist Meredy Dubbs and outside hitter Danielle Wessel. Dubbs averaged 2.93 digs per game last season while Wessel contributed 1.68 digs and 0.79 kills per game. "Meredy is without a doubt one of the best passers I've ever coached. We are hoping she can anchor our serve receive area and keep us in system," said Kneifl. "Dani has trained at many different positions for us in her three seasons here. She is a great athlete and a dynamic attacker."

The lone junior on the team is Tessa Wietfeld of Leigh, a defensive specialist. She filled in last year in a pair of matches at libero and averaged 4.85 digs per game while appearing in six matches behind Dolezal.

The sophomore class played a key role in the success of last year's team will be asked to do the same again this season. 6-1 middle blocker Jennifer Hefner (Central City) had the top hitting percentage for the 'Cats last season (.257) while averaging 2.34 kills and 1.16 blocks per game.

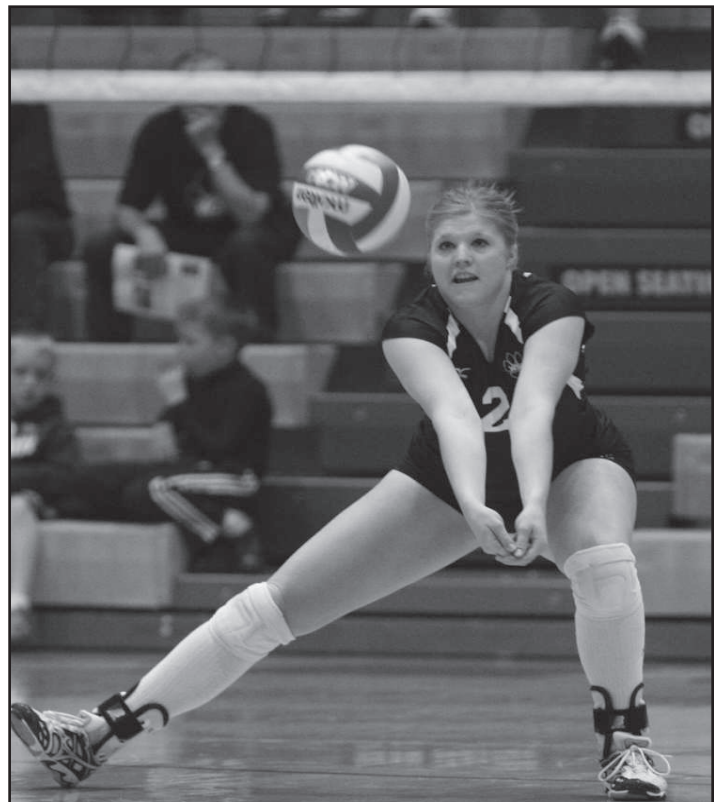

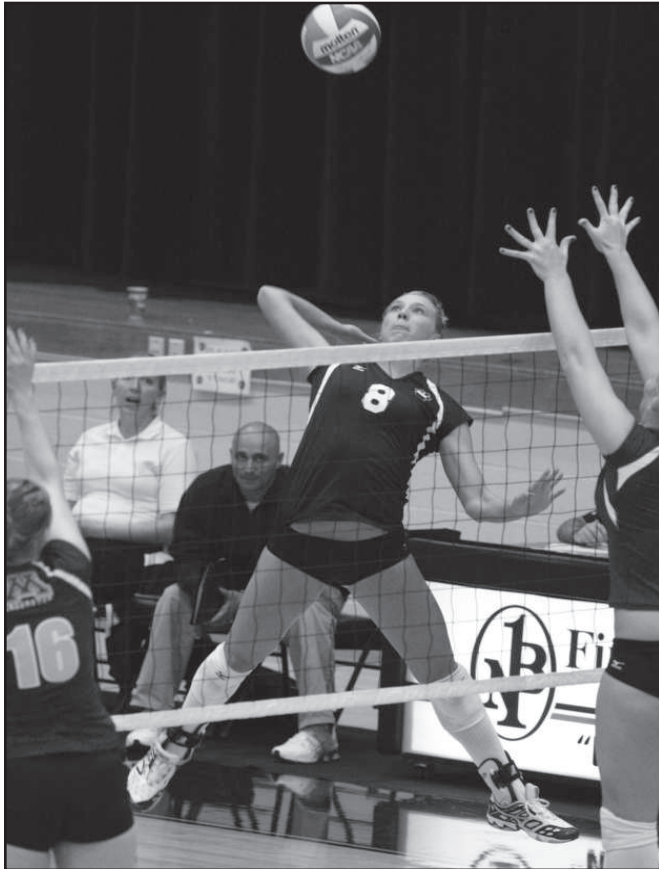

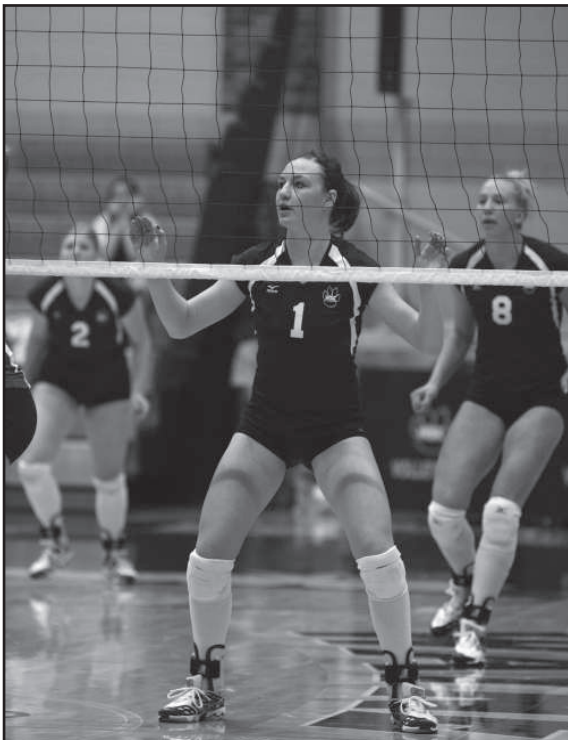

THE NORTHERN SUN INTERCOLLEGIATE CONFERENCE



Founded in 1932, the Northern Intercollegiate Conference (NIC) has enjoyed a varied existence in the upper Midwest region it calls home. In the spring of 1992 the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference (NSIC) was formed out of the merger of the NIC, the men's conference, and the women's Northern Sun Conference (NSC). The NSC had existed since 1979. The NSIC is currently made up of institutions from Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota. In the 2008-09 academic year, the NSIC expanded to a 14-team league with the addition of Augustana College, University of Minnesota Duluth, Minnesota State University, Mankato and St. Cloud State University.

Since 1932, various institutions have competed in the NSIC. Bemidji State University, Minnesota State University Moorhead and Winona State University are charter members and have remained in the conference for the 76 years of its existence. Minnesota State University, Mankato and St. Cloud State were also charter members, but left the league in 1981 (MSU left the league in 1969 and returned in 1977). The University of Minnesota Duluth, which departed the league in 2005-06 through 2007-08 seasons, was also an original member. Other current members joined in later years: Southwest Minnesota State University in 1969, Northern State University in 1978, Wayne State College (Nebraska) in 1998, Concordia University, St. Paul and the University of Minnesota, Crookston in 1999, the University of Mary and Upper Iowa University in 2006 and Augustana College in 2008. The University of Minnesota, Morris became a league member in 1966, however, the Cougars opted for the NCAA Division III ranks in 2003. Michigan Tech was part of the NIC from 1969 to 1977 as well.

Before the NSIC became eligible for National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) championship competition in 1995, its member institutions had an extremely rich tradition in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The NIC's and NSC's tenure in the NAIA included several national championship teams and individuals as well as many national qualifiers.

The NSIC has gained national recognition in recent years as three teams have won National Championships. Winona State men's

basketball made three straight trips to the NCAA Division II National Championship game, winning the 2006 and 2008 games and losing the 2007 game on a last second shot. During that period, the Warriors won an NCAA record 57 consecutive games. Concordia University, St. Paul garnered the first women's title in 2007 as its volleyball team won the National Championship.

Following the 2004-05 season, Winona State became the first team other than Minnesota Duluth to capture the NSIC All-Sports Competition trophy. The Warriors have taken home the trophy now the last two seasons. Winona State put the NSIC on the national map in 2006 as they hosted and won the NCAA North Central Regional Tournament and went on to capture the Division II National Championship.

Since 2000, the NSIC has participated in one of two officially-sanctioned NCAA Division II football bowl games in the country. Dating back to 1948, the Mineral Water Bowl is hosted by the Quarterback Club of Excelsior Springs, Missouri. The game matches the highest-finishing team from the NSIC not selected for the NCAA Division II playoffs against the highest-finishing team from the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association (MIAA) not participating in the NCAA Division II playoffs. The first NSIC/MIAA meeting in 2000 marked the Mineral Water Bowl's inaugural year of the Division II era. Wayne State represented the NSIC in the 2007 Mineral Water Bowl game and dropped a hard-fought 20-13 contest to Missouri Western.

Over the years the NSIC, comprised of schools of modest size, has provided extremely competitive intercollegiate athletic programs for its members. Although the programs are not designed to be equal to Division I athletics, many former NSIC athletes have distinguished themselves in national and international competition. Each member school emphasizes the educational, entertainment and unifying value of sports while pointing with pride to the many advantages to be gained by attending these colleges and universities. As some affiliated with the conference have coined, the NSIC quite possibly is, "the most competitive conference in NCAA Division II."
